### A letter from your President

I am writing this at the end of Prison's Week and have just read the prayer "Praying With Workers" which finishes with the sentence "Tune us in to the surprising movement of your Spirit." Unbelievably, last night I received an email from Mary Sumner House asking for help for a family from Staffordshire who are waiting for news about a relative recently sent to HMP Manchester. Fortunately, our relationship with the prison has meant we were able to get a

prompt response within 24 hours. Building relationships with other organisations, our churches, our clergy and with each other, is a vital part of what we must do in Mothers' Union in order to move forward. We have been, and are exploring MULOA (Mothers' Union, Listening, Observing and Acting) to see where we are as Branches, where we fit in, where we are being asked to go and what we are being asked to do. I would really encourage you to try and come to Spring Council next year, as this is where you will hear so much more about what is going on, hear from those we support and find out what we are trying to achieve in the future. Did you know that our CEO Bev Jullien was in Manchester speaking to our clergy recently and that our Worldwide President Sheran Harper is in York Province in November and will experience what we in Manchester do to support The Clewer Initiative? I wonder how many of you have remembered about our Spring Grassroots Challenge of sending in prayers and poems for a booklet "In Step with God." It would be amazing if every Branch could contribute one piece. Maybe children or grandchildren would like to write something. It's so important to include children in what we do, as was evident at our Diocesan Festival. Make sure you find out about our Autumn Grassroots Challenge! Next year's theme is "Building, Hope and Confidence" - the hope and confidence we wish to achieve for ourselves and for others. Let's continue to build on those small things we know we do well. Zip, Zip and away for 'Welcoming Strangers' Barbara Silvester, a member at Christ Church Walmersley, Bury for 37 years, decided she wanted to celebrate her recent 70<sup>th</sup> Birthday in a different way. Instead of the usual gifts from friends and family at her Birthday Celebrations, she asked if they would sponsor her on a Zip wire challenge for the MU Manchester 'Welcoming Strangers' . Her husband Nigel, also a member of Mothers' Union, paid for the experience in Wales at Blaenau Ffestiniog Slate Caverns, and so on



Saturday 18<sup>th</sup> May they set off to the Titan Zip accompanied by family member onlookers! After being trussed up like a Tellytubby in a red boiler suit and having all the safety equipment attached, it weighed a 'ton,' she was loaded into a mini bus that took her and eight others to the top of the Slate mines some 1,581ft above sea level. Then began the decent. The first zip line was the longest and slowest – about 25mph over gaping holes in the ground, a long way down, for about 1000 yards, a short trek down to the next zip line, which was shorter but faster at about 35 mph and then a slog up hill to the final zip which reached a speed of about 45 mph. All in all, over 1.25 miles were travelled by Zip line. Barbara says "It was brilliant, the other eight were a group of men celebrating the 50<sup>th</sup>



birthday of one of them, who took me on board as an 'honorary granny' and we had a great laugh. They were interested in what the Mothers' Union were doing in 'Welcoming Strangers.' My friends and family were very generous and made donations totalling £690, which with gift aid will have added £857 to the fund. Was I scared? Not

at all, I knew I was in safe hands! (Jesus') and compared to what the people from Syria have been through to escape it was a doddle." What a fantastic achievement, Well done Barbara!

### Celebrating the Family, Manchester Diocesan Annual Festival

On 28<sup>th</sup> September at St Ann's Church Manchester, the Annual Diocesan Festival was held with Archdeacon David Sharples presiding. The theme was a celebration of the Family, in all its shapes, and sizes. Archdeacon David talked about treating each person as if they were our own. ### News from Overseas, The Diocese of Popondota, PNG

MU member Cecilia from Eroro, Diocese of Popondota, dressed beautifully in the traditional style as she waits to welcome Lydia Gladwin from Mary Sumner House visiting Mothers' Union members in ACPNG (Anglican Church of Papua New Guinea) around 2000. Her headband has 4 birds of paradise incorporated in it, flowers tucked in behind armbands, long necklaces of shells and seeds, and a pig tusks ornament.

The Cathedral of the Resurrection was built about 1977 when the Diocese of Papua New Guinea became a separate Anglican Province, divided into 5

Dioceses as shown on the map. The church grounds are on the outskirts of Popondetta which is the Provincial capital of Oro Province. Papua New Guinea is divided into 22 Government Provinces. Notice the low walls - when there is a big celebration, the congregation numbers are boosted by those standing outside and looking in.









A village less than 20 miles from Popondetta, with traditional houses at extreme R and L and in the distance, and a more modern one with an iron roof in the centre (though the timber with which it is constructed is fairly roughly sawn). The low long building behind the van is probably the village church, note the half walls too. The van is likely to be a PMV - public motor vehicle, owned by a family here, which takes passengers and cargo to and from Popondetta. A garden of healthy looking Taro (favourite staple in Oro lowlands) is front left. Main gardens are outside the village. There are 29 different languages in Oro Province, and the one spoken in this area is Orokaiva which is the largest. There are at least 850 different languages in the whole country of PNG. You would recognise the banana and coconut trees, and I think the tallest tree is a breadfruit, which they cook and eat.

This river is not far from the village above, and women are washing clothes (and bodies) and making it a sociable time. Men would wash in a separate section of the river. The climate in this area has 2 seasons, hot and wet, and hot and wetter!
