Trimming back



I am sitting here looking out into our garden and in particular at what was a very large Ceanothus bush. Over many years it has grown into a beautiful part of garden. the Covered in blue flowers in the summer when it would be buzzing

with insects and a haven for small birds all year round as they queued up waiting for a turn on the bird feeders. It was a splendid plant! I say 'what was' because, with reluctance, we have recently come to the conclusion that we can no longer manage it. It has grown too big and we are finding it increasingly difficult to reach up to trim it and it has actually taken over a huge part of the garden – preventing other plants from growing. So armed with saw and secateurs we methodically set to work and it is now much reduced in size!

This pruning operation very much mirrors my own recent decision to trim back on my church activities. Most of you will know that I am not renewing my authority to be an ALM - which was due for renewal this September. Health issues together with, dare I say it, reaching a certain age (!) led me to seriously consider my ability to continue with everything I was involved with at church. Like the ceanothus my activities have grown beyond what I now find manageable. Trimming back was required.

I will now become an ALM Emeritus and over the coming months I intend to ease back from some of the rotas and duties which I have been part of for a good while. I am looking to take up on some of that promised retirement time and to have more time for family. I am not seeking to completely step off the rota treadmill but you will not see me quite so prominently in future!

Jesus had much to say about taking rest; being weary; and seeking some quietness. He withdrew from his work and encouraged his disciples to do the same so that they could rest. As David Robinson reminded us in last month's magazine – God rested after all his creative labouring. My belief is that God knows when it is time for us to step off the treadmill and just take stock. And as we get older we need to do that all the more. We all need to care for our physical as well as our spiritual needs. Rest and attention to the health of our souls is important. Making decisions in these things I would definitely recommend conversation with family and with God. In the words from Proverbs 3 – "Trust in the Lord and do not rely on your own insight; it will be healing for your flesh and a refreshment for your body."

Please take note that I am not advocating that we all down tools! But I do think we all need to regularly take a pause; look at what we're doing – or not doing! – reassess and move forward.

Our intention for our ceanothus bush is that it will continue to give us the beauty and joy it has done in the past and continue to be there and to grow but in more manageable proportions. The same is the plan for me and church life!

At **St John with St Mark** we shall welcome contributions to the work of Caritas and Porch. This includes the usual items such as tinned produce, packet foods, biscuits, tea / coffee.

Christ Church PCC meeting of the 26th July 2022

The vicar confirmed that the concert on 10th December was in the band's diary. The concert booking on 29th October was under review. (*Now agreed*)

There is still a desire to have two carol services this year: at Christ Church and at St John with St Mark. The ministry team continue to discuss. *(Now agreed)* The plaque for Arthur was further discussed and a faculty will be required.

The lack of readings for the gas and electricity during the covid period was discussed by the treasurer and progress has been made to resolve the issue.

There was a long discussion on the proposed changes to the garden of remembrance and it was finally decided after a vote to go forward with a communal style garden of remembrance with small memorial plaques. The congregation will be consulted, and the final decision will be made by the PCC.

Amy Paterson was admitted as a sidesperson by the members of the PCC.

The ECO church energy footprint tool was discussed and is to be completed by the end of July. The vicar considered that the ECO church scheme is important and should be followed up. (ECO CHURCH is a scheme run by A Rocha UK, equipping churches to care for God's creation. By completing an online survey, churches can be considered for an Eco Church Award at either Bronze, Silver, or Gold level. There are currently 896 Bronze, 294 Silver, and 18 Gold Church of England Eco Churches, and even our first gold cathedral; Salisbury. There are 5 areas a church must demonstrate environmental engagement with to receive an award: Worship and teaching, Management of church buildings. Management of church land, Community and global engagement, Lifestyle.)

The situation with Morris homes was discussed and there is no further information regarding planning permission at this time.

The three music and copyright licences that the church holds are up for renewal and the PCC voted to renew them. Cath Hilton volunteered to pay for a licence to download Christian music from CCLI which had previously been paid for by Nigel Silvester.

It was noted that Nigel Silvester is now going to be an ALM emeritus.

Safeguarding was discussed by Cath Hilton. Cath will approach the sidespersons to try and get them to take the online course regarding safeguarding.

It was noted that the parish share for 2023 will be reviewed and is under discussion.

Looking back over the past 9 years there have been so many occasions to remember. So many people to recall. Times of happiness and sadness. One of the roles of Vicar in a parish is to share in people's lives in a very special way – and that is a great privilege.

I will be presiding for the final time at the Benefice service on Sunday 30 October at St. John with St. Mark. My induction as Vicar of the Benefice of St. Margaret's Halliwell & Christ Church Heaton will take place on Wednesday 9 November at Heaton, beginning at 7.30pm. All are welcome.

Please pray for Linda & me as we move parishes, as I will pray for you all and the process of appointing my replacement. In the meantime, the Mission Community Leader Julian Heaton and our Area Dean Rachel Mann will be available for guidance. The Ministry Team will continue to lead services with outside help. Please support the wardens and other church leaders during the time of interregnum.

- * It was good that we were able to open both churches for prayer and reflection following the death of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. These unprecedented times will be remembered for years to come as we mourn the passing of our longest serving monarch and we have played our part in this process. Thanks to all who helped enable this to happen.
- * The Men of the Benefice (MOB) meet on the last Monday of each month. We gather at the Towler Inn from 8pm.

- * Christ Church are continuing to use the facility for contactless payments. The card reading machine is situated at the back of church. If you wish to use this, please contact one of the church officers at Christ Church.
- * We are still awaiting the decision of Bury Council's Planning Department following the signing of the contract between Christ Church PCC and Morris Homes to build houses on the church field. Comments have been requested from members of the public and the outcome will be announced as soon as a decision is made.
- * Churches Together in Bury represent most of the Christian Churches in the town. The group meets every two months, with a prayer group which meets fortnightly. They have now begun to meet in person again. Anyone is able to attend these meetings. Details will be in the Bulletin / News Sheet in the relevant weeks.
- * Porch Boxes are always in need of food and toiletries especially in this current situation. A box is available at the back of both churches. Thanks to those who support those in need.
- * Regular attenders to church are encouraged to join our planned giving scheme. If you would like to do so or would like some further information, please speak to one of the Treasurers

Like a lot of you, each year I have to complete a Self-Assessment Tax Return for the lovely, kind-hearted people at the Inland Revenue. They use it to calculate how much Income Tax I owe them.

I wonder what would be revealed if each year we were also obliged to do a Self-Assessment of how we spent our time as well as our money. What would such an audit say about how we used our resources? Would it bring to light what we thought was important?

That relationship between faith and resource is commonplace in the teachings of Jesus. For instance, Matthew 6:9-13, the one about the birds in the air and the lilies in the field. Later, 1 Timothy 6:11-19 talks about being 'rich in good works, generous and ready to share.' It's clear that our time and our possessions are not disconnected from our beliefs and - much like how we act or speak - how we spend our time and money is a good signifier of what lies beneath the surface.

In both these Bible passages we find teaching that encourages us to hold 'stuff' lightly. Not because such things are inherently bad, but because they can get in the way of our relationship with God. When anxiety over food, clothes, and shelter become the priority, then we become distracted from the relationship that truly brings life.

Such is the impact of possessions on daily life, that not only can they come between us and God, but they can also distort our perspectives on the community around us and the Truth of life in its fullness. When money is our priority, God becomes small.

Whilst we know God has provided all that we might need, we also know that there are many for whom worry and anxiety for food, clothes, and shelter are justified life-and-death concerns. Walk through any town or city centre and the extent of this is clear. And that's not to mention the hundreds of millions across the world who live in poverty.

Someone may ask: "But if the lilies in the field are so finely clothed, why has God let so many die for want of a decent jacket to keep them warm?" Well, another parable might help us answer that.

The parable of the sower may highlight how we have not played our part. The seeds have the potential to deliver all that they have been promised and yet

the land (that's us) may not offer them the conditions to flourish. So, how can we ensure that each and every plot of land (that's us again) is cultivated to make the most of the resources so generously given to us by God?

The passage in Timothy makes it clear: we should share and be generous. This is not only for the good of the community but also for personal wellbeing. Generosity enables money to no longer be a distraction but to be a signifier of God's love in the world. If there are people who are hungry, cold, and in need of a roof over their heads, then as the hands and feet of Christ, it's our calling and responsibility to provide that. There's enough of everything in this world to go around. If someone is lacking, it's because someone else has already got more than enough and has spare to share with others.

It's often said that we should give sacrificially. That our generosity should be so great that we notice it. This is true. But also the more often that you give generously the more it stops being so 'sacrificial' because eventually it starts becoming who we are. Something is sacrificial when it hurts or impacts us. But by the tenth time of giving, the impact is lessened. It may still be as generous as the first time, it may still in "real-terms" affect our life or bank balance just the same. However, over time it becomes commonplace and is the signifier of our faith in the love and provision of God. It is evidence of our holding it lightly.

We are called to be generous. So how do we become more generous? By being more generous! You can't shortcut your way to generosity, but the more you do it, the easier it becomes.

October is the time that we celebrate Harvest. A time to think of God's generosity to us. It's also an ideal opportunity to think about how we each can be more generous to others in return. Generous with our money, our possessions and, yes, with our time too. Time might be our most precious commodity. How do we spend it?

Lord, teach me to be generous.

Teach me to serve you as you deserve; to give and not to count the cost, to fight and not to heed the wounds, to toil and not to seek for rest, to labour and not to ask for reward, save that of knowing that I do your will. **Amen.**



for his talk entitled 'from PC to FD to I'. The talk actually began in reverse order as Julian explained his current role as 'I' for an 'investigator' for solicitors.

The main focus of the evening was on the 'PC', as Julian gave us an overview of his work as a Police Constable from the early 1980's in Yorkshire, particularly Halifax and Bradford. Julian had a wish from an early age to join the force and we were first given an insight into the rigorous training required and standards which needed to be met. Regular haircuts were quite common by all accounts! If you ever remember the TV show 'Life on Mars', well this was the police force of that time.

As in every job, you have to start at the beginning and get all the good jobs! Cleaning up cells on Friday and Saturday nights was normal for a rookie copper. Julian also briefed us on the first time he had to deal with the deceased.

The group seemed to enjoy the talk and one or two others shared similar experiences at the end of the evening. We did not actually get to the 'FD' – Funeral Director. However at least that gives us a meeting for next year with the second instalment. Thank you to Julian for giving us a behind the scenes peak into the work of a police officer.



WHY WE NEED A REAL ADVENT CALENDAR

The Calendar was created in 2013 following surveys showing that 36% of 5-7 year olds did not know whose birthday is celebrated at Christmas. 51% of adults said that the birth of Jesus was irrelevant to their Christmas.

It is easy for Christ to be removed from the general marketing of Christmas. The Real Advent Calendar exists to place the story of Jesus' birth at the heart of Christmas.

To help spread the Christmas story the Real Advent Calendar was created with a line of the Christmas story behind each of the 25 doors and a corresponding page in the Christmas story-activity book which expands the story and sometimes sets an Advent challenge.

Kids love the Fairtrade chocolate and they love the book. Parents enjoy reading it with their kids and leaning more about the Christmas story and traditions. Every year there is a new edition using top children's illustrators.

The Real Advent Calendar is a great way to put Christ back into the hearts of those who no longer know the Christmas story.
