- * Please support our Wardens and Ministry team during the time of interregnum. We are grateful to Archdeacon Jean, Area Dean Rachel and our Mission Community Leader, Julian Heaton, who are all available for guidance if for any reason the 'home' team can't help you.
- * The Ministry Team (Clergy, Licensed Readers and our Authorised Lay Minister) meets every month normally on the second Tuesday evening. If you have an issue that you would like them to discuss, please contact one of the team.
- * The Ministry rota for services from January to March 2023 has been filled. As it stands, all the current mix of regular services are covered. Many thanks to our own ministry team and to visiting ministers.
- * There will be no midweek services between Christmas and New Year
- * PCC's meet in December to select their two representatives and look at the Benefice profile.
- * We're awaiting the diocese to address some areas of damp in the vicarage.
- * Tickets are now available for the Band Concert at Christ Church on 10th December see page 36
- * Porch Boxes are always in need of food and toiletries especially in this current situation. A box is available at the back of both churches. Thanks to those who support those in need.
- * A thought from Churches Together: If you do not need all the Energy Bills Support discount being applied to every household, why not make a contribution to the fund Christians Against Poverty locally are using, to help those currently struggling with debt and having great difficulty meeting bills such as gas and electricity. Speak to one of our treasurers if you would like more information.
- * Regular attenders to church are encouraged to join our planned giving scheme. If you would like to do so or would like some further information, please speak to one of the treasurers.

Report of Christ Church PCC meeting on 3rd November 2022

- 1. The minutes from the 28th of September meeting were proposed and accepted as a true record.
- 2. The annual income survey has been completed and sent in. The requisite number of forms was obtained.
- 3. The afternoon tea raised £206 and the Lay chair thanked everyone involved in the organisation of the event.
- 4. The treasurer noted that the church gas contract was fixed until May 2024 and the electric until January 2025.
- 5. The treasurer noted that income had held up but that there was a concern regarding increased costs which may be a problem if income does not increase. The diocese has an excellent giving officer and it was considered that maybe we should meet with him.
- 6. Geoff Hamilton had suggested that the attendance in church should be on the financial report. The Treasurer will do this on a monthly basis.
- 7. The secretary noted that the relevant forms and instructions had been received from the Diocesan registrar regarding the appointment of a new vicar. The process will start in February next year.
- 8. The secretary noted that the faculty for the garden of remembrance extension would be sent in to the diocese shortly as the relevant costs for the wall had been received.
- 9. Hazel Bamford raised that we had three lay trustees for the Church, most recently Stanley Parkinson, Arthur Smith and Hazel Bamford. The PCC agreed with Hazel that the two deceased trustees should be replaced. The secretary is to approach the Diocesan registrar to determine what is needed to be done.
- 10. It was noted by our contracted heating engineer that the church boiler was 40 years old and was the lowest efficiency rating (G). The secretary was asked to find out the cost for replacing the boiler. The secretary was also asked to get someone to look at the ladies' choir stall heater.
- 11. The pastoral report was discussed. It was felt we should arrange for someone to take the 11.30pm service on Christmas Eve if at all possible.
- 12.An increase in the price of the church magazine was discussed but no decisions made until discussed with St John with St Mark PCC.
- 13. Control of the churches' Facebook pages has now been resolved. We were asked to consider one rather than two separate pages for the benefice.

Summary of the St. John with St. Mark meeting of 3 November 2022

- DBS Latest One application has recently been completed.
- Faculty for removing pews at back of church now been approved.
 Nobody has come forward saying they would like a pew, so these will be removed and taken to auction. It is still intended to remove the piece of carpet at the end of the aisle to make full use of the area.
- Mission Community A meeting has taken place with members of other Churches in the MC to discuss ways of working together and sharing worship with each other. An Advent service will take place at the Parish Church on Sunday 27th November; the possibility of joint study groups is being considered; a discussion about parish share allocation will take place at a future MC meeting; the Deanery Mission Action Plan was discussed and how best to encourage growth.
- #More Than Sunday A 7-part course has begun with other Churches in the Mission Community in the Barritt Room, monthly on a Saturday morning. This encourages us to explore our faith and how we can put this into action Monday to Saturday. Anybody can attend future sessions even if you have not been to the first two.
- Correspondence A letter has been received from Seedfield Tenants & Residents Association inviting us to a meeting to discuss traffic concerns with the new Seedfield housing development.
- Charitable Giving It was once again agreed to support the same charities as last year as part of our charitable giving commitment. Any loose collection from the Christmas services and the magazine greetings this year will be split between Ukraine appeals and CRISIS.
- Other Finance Ian made us aware of the tax we have claimed back from the previous tax year; the recent coffee morning raised £316; a list is to be put at the back of Church to see who is keen to resume the 100 Club and whether there is sufficient interest in the New Year.
- Wardens Report We were made aware that all our regular Sunday and weekday services have been covered following the usual pattern. Thank you to all ministers who have volunteered.
- Interregnum We need to begin work on our Parish profile in the New Year and this will be done jointly with Christ Church. The timeline and plans for the next few months of the process were discussed.
- Health & Safety Keith made us aware that the DEFIB needs a new battery and this will be replaced.
- Next PCC Meeting is on Tuesday 6th December at 7.30pm to discuss the parish profile and vacancy.

Following feedback from dioceses and parishes, the Church of England is returning to the popular **Follow The Star** branding to encourage people to attend their local church at Christmas and take the next step on their journey of faith.

The resources for 2022 will focus on **The Great Invitation** — encouraging everyone to share the joy of gathering together to celebrate the birth of Jesus with their family, friends and neighbours — especially after two years where this has been impossible for many.

The campaign will include:

- Reflections 12 Advent reflections for us to share on the theme of 'invitation'. If you have a smartphone why not download the app?
- Reflections booklet which will be available in church
- National online services services broadcast on the Sundays in Advent and at Christmas for those unable to join in our worship
- Christmas cards which we will deliver to as many in our community as is feasible (can you help?)



Please share our social media posts (Facebook, Twitter and Instagram) so they are seen by a far wider audience. If you are a member of community groups that is a great way to share the invitation.

Christmas is a wonderful time to encourage others to join you in church – don't be shy of issuing the invitation.

Just as importantly, if you have not come recently, we'd love to see **you**.

In Memoriam: Meg Schofield

Meg Schofield was born in Bury and attended Bury High School where I was one of her classmates. She was very sporting, captaining the school tennis team and playing a ferocious game of hockey. We studied sciences together and at the end of our education were jointly awarded the "Miss Wilkinson prize for character". Neither of us knew what we had done to deserve it.

Meg then went to Liverpool where she studied pharmacy and on qualification worked at Bury General and Fairfield Hospitals. I am sure her attention to detail and organisational skills were put to good use.

In 1959 she married David, and they set up home in Bury and their three children were born. She was a loving and devoted mother encouraging her children and giving them a strong moral compass.

She worked as a volunteer on the reception at the old hospice and also in the shop. To help people experiencing difficulties she trained as a bereavement counsellor.

She was a committed Christian and took a full part in church activities. She led intercessions, was a church cleaner, an enthusiastic member of the Mothers' Union and made insightful contributions to study groups. One of her great strengths was talking to people. If newcomers came into church Meg would be the first to greet them - she was a one-woman welcoming committee.

In recent years she was a devoted carer for David. And in the last months as she suffered from the distressing, disabling effects of Motor Neurone Disease she showed a depth of courage, dignity and resilience which was quite frankly awesome.

Meg lived out the two great commandments, her faith in God never wavered and she served others regardless of who they were. She will be greatly missed.

We shall shout the joyous news with our loudest voice, so that everyone may know the reason to rejoice.



#MoreThanSunday

You probably spend at least 90% of your life outside of church.

#MoreThanSunday is a learning journey - exploring what it means to follow Christ, Monday to Saturday beyond church in our work, education, community and family contexts.

Currently there is an opportunity to join this journey, meeting monthly at St John with St Mark. There are seven 'Shifts' in the journey, which began in September. Our most recent session in November focussed on "Faith at Home", with a particular emphasis on how this flourished during lockdown and how some of these incentives continue today. There was then an opportunity to discuss how we can encourage ourselves and our congregations to grow in faith within their homes and families.

The fourth shift is on Saturday 21st January 2023 in the Barritt Room at St. John with St. Mark and the theme is "Small Groups", looking at traditions such as Lent study groups, or courses such as Alpha or Start. We meet in a hybrid environment with other Mission Communities joining us on Zoom. Please note, no December meeting.

This is a great opportunity for everyone to feel more confident about their faith. Why not 'give it a go'? You do not have to have attended the previous three sessions or feel compelled to come to any of the others.

The Priory Highbank Centre

This Centre provides care for people with neurodisabilities resulting from acquired brain injuries.

In earlier years a group visited, around four times a year, the residents of this centre, for a short service of songs, prayers and reading - followed usually by tea and cakes. Since the pandemic we have been unable to visit but are delighted to have been invited to return.

Our first invitation is to join them on December 1 at 4pm for a Lights Switch-on, to include mince pies, hot chocolate and non-alcoholic mulled wine.

We would hope to visit again near Easter. If you would like to join our group please have a word with one of the Wardens.

A reflection for Epiphany

It's the season of starlight, kings and gifts. We hear again stories of the first pilgrims seeking Jesus, of a dove descending on God's beloved Son and of water turned to wine.

It's the season of revelation, light and joy as God, born as man, shows us again his presence among us.

The light shines in the darkness and in the stories we hear there are dark shadows. There is a king, deceitful, cruel and vindictive who seeks the light only to destroy it. There is myrrh, a gift bringing to mind the bitter suffering this child is born to face.


There were the usual topics of conversation around the table, including football, cruise holidays, work, our history, oh and I think the Interregnum was discussed!


