#### Dear Friends

The interesting thing about harvest is that people have become more and more keen on celebrating it the further they have got from being the ones who gather in the crops in the fields.

The harvest festival is a festival which most people think goes back into the mists of time. We imagine joyful peasants accompanying horse drawn carts full of produce back into barns. We imagine the whole village coming together to celebrate that all has been safely gathered in. And a lot of us, quite probably, think back to harvests festivals that we knew as a child and fondly imagine that it was ever thus.

Not so, of course.

The "all is safely gathered in" style of harvest festival is something that is pretty modern and goes back little further than our Victorian forebears. The hymns that people tend to think of as being traditional harvest hymns have relatively modern dates to them. You will find little mention of harvest festival in the Book of Common Prayer.

Harvest is something of a muddle. Yet we still celebrate it and I think that it is right that we should. Let me give three reasons why.



Firstly, it is good to be thankful.

Secondly, it is good to recognise the labours of others.

Thirdly, it helps us to be aware of the spirituality of the environment, and our place as human beings on this beautiful, but fragile planet.

Let me take those one by one.

First, it is good to be thankful. Indeed, I think that being a thankful person is part of what it means to be a whole person. Everyone has in them a sense of thankfulness. There is not a culture in the world which does not try to teach its children to be thankful people. To be thankful is to be human. Secondly, whether it is the virtues of science, or the skills of a team or those who do indeed gather the harvest in the fields, it doesn't matter. We rely on others for our daily bread. And it is good to remember them once in a while. To remember our interdependence is to think of others and to do so is to extend our sense of thankfulness beyond being thankful simply to our creator God but also to being thankful for our neighbours.

And finally, let us remember on this harvest festival day the environment. As the years go on, our stewardship of creation is held up to ever greater account. Let the urgency of the need to keep the environment in mind never leave us when we come into church. Let us green our faith. Let us celebrate the bounty of the earth year by year. But furthermore let us also ensure that all God's people are fed and that we care for and sustain his creation so that it continues to be bountiful for all.


### Week Three A Celtic prayer

One way to share the story is through the 2015 Real Advent Calendar which has just been launched.

The calendar includes a free 32-page story/activity booklet, this year illustrated by Sophie Allsopp and designed to be used every day in Advent. The booklet gives more details about the Christmas story, with all the familiar nativity characters mentioned along with seven Advent challenges. Behind each calendar window there is a line of the Christmas story and a Fairtrade Belgian chocolate, 24 in all.

This is the third year that the Real Advent calendar has been available and so far  $\pounds$ 42,000 has been donated from sales to charity. The 2015 Real Advent Calendar is the UK's only charity Advent calendar, supporting the Funzi Clinic and Traidcraft Exchange; it is now available and will soon be in the shops.

Beat the three ingredients well together. Form into equal cookie-size pieces and place on a greased baking sheet. Bake 10min at  $180^{\circ}$ C. Leave to cool for a couple of minutes before taking off tray.

ST JOHN WITH ST MARK PCC MEETING OF 3 SEPTEMBER 2015

There has been further progress with several issues since the last meeting. We have now received approval from the DAC for us to dispose of surplus items of furniture from Church. These are the four pews, two chairs, a prayer desk and Bishop's seat. These items are now in the process of being removed. We have received an offer of £375 from a company that has an interest in some Church furnishings. Ashworth Valley campsite has agreed to take the pews from us for their own usage.

Planning permission has now been received from the council for us to proceed with the West Window. We can now therefore look at the various costs and timescales involved.

It has been confirmed that the Bonfire party scheduled for Friday 6th November will definitely go ahead, and volunteers will be sought to help with the various jobs.

The Website was discussed and Ian once again provided us with some informative statistics as to how many visitors we have had, and how they came to find our Website. A reminder was made to keep on sending updated reports and features to keep the Website 'fresh'.

Ian Banks is the new licensee for the bar and he has attended and completed a licensing course. Ian provided us with some information from that course we needed to be aware of.

Following the success of the services at Christ Church, it has been decided that we will hold a Café Church service at 10.30am on Sunday 10th January 2016, to coincide with the celebration of the Baptism of Christ. This will be a non Eucharistic service held in the Hall.

The next PCC meeting has been rescheduled for Thursday 22nd October and a joint PCC meeting with Christ Church will be held on Tuesday 8th December.

Diocesan Synod has approved an updated Parish Share system. While this builds on the positive aspects of the existing system, it also adds an opportunity for parishes to have a discussion with representatives of the Diocesan Board of Finance. The new system will also give parishes an assessment for a three-year period.

As part of the introduction of the changes, meetings to discuss parish assessments will be held with some 45 parishes this year. In 2016 and 2017 there will be 85 meetings per year, with the remaining parishes being visited in 2018.

The process of meeting with all parishes will be a resource intensive exercise and an invitation is being extended to people from across the diocese to become members of the "Discussion and Agreement" teams. These teams will represent the Diocesan Board of Finance in meetings with a small number of people from individual parishes to come to an agreement regarding the parish share.

The Diocese is looking for people who have some understanding of parish finance, perhaps as a treasurer, or relevant experience from employment or other charitable work. If you are interested in this role, please contact Richard O'Connell email: <u>RichardOConnell@manchester.anglican.org</u>, outlining your experience and what you think you can offer to the process. For the volunteers who form the overall "Discussion and Agreement" group, induction and training will be held at Church House on Deansgate.

# Mothers'UN ON

Christian care for families

At one of our previous meetings entitled 'Eagles Wings' we learnt how asylum seekers and refugees in Bury are assisted and supported in their attempts to integrate into British culture. This was aptly timed. We are all too familiar with the horrific pictures which fill the media of unsuccessful efforts of those fleeing from persecution and conflict. Mothers' Union has responded with the following statement:

Following its affirmation on 4th September that it is committed to supporting refugees, Mothers' Union's membership has made a universally postitive and heartwarming response. Members have indicated a strong willingness to work closely with the Church and other organisations and agencies locally, to ensure that refugees are made welcome in Britain and Ireland when they arrive. In a number of dioceses, collaborative arrangements are already in place.

Speaking on 11th September, Beverley Jullien, CEO of Mothers' Union said, "We welcome the fact that the Church in Europe has requested that Us organises an appeal for Hungary and Greece in particular. Mothers' Union members in affected areas have committed to help with relief work."

"The refugees, all who are supporting them, and the governments taking decisions on managing this crisis and the wider strategic challenges of migration across the globe, remain in our prayers."

### Statement from 4th September

Mothers' Union today affirmed its commitment to support refugees fleeing conflict and persecution and seeking sanctuary in Europe.

"Mothers' Union has the potential to help churches and communities right at the grassroots level maximise the support they can give – through prayer, through advocacy and through practical support" said Worldwide President, Lynne Tembey. "We recognise the complexity of the situations faced by governments across Europe in dealing effectively with this crisis both in the short and longer term, and they are much in our prayers. However, regardless of current government and EU policy, this is a situation which requires a heartfelt response from each one of us. We welcome the leadership and encouragement of the Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby today, affirming that whilst our individual efforts may seem trivial, by working together we can resolve crises and make a difference."

"Today I am calling on our membership across the world to make that heartfelt response. We have a long history of helping those fleeing persecution, conflict or violence. Whilst across many parts of the world: Africa, Oceania, and Asia, we are experienced in dealing with large-scale crises of this nature, it is many years since we have been faced by such a crisis in Europe. But our membership here, as across the globe, will, I know, have a heart to meet the humanitarian needs of families – both physical and spiritual. We are committed to playing our part in both the prayerful and the practical outreach of the Church."

Mothers' Union has over 72,000 members in Europe, predominantly in Britain & Ireland, but including small branches within Europe of members who were themselves asylum seekers who fled conflict. Every year Mothers' Union across the world, most recently in developing countries, brings emergency relief to around 25,000 people through the provision of food, basic household provisions of blankets and sleeping bags, cooking utensils, water sanitation kits and soap.

Our 106th Birthday celebration was held in the Church Hall with a Bring and Share meal. We were generously fed with delicious food thanks to the members. It was a double celebration as we welcomed into membership Karen Hawkins.

## TRAINING FOR MINISTERS


As part of its regular training programme for clergy, the Manchester Diocese is arranging "Formation Days" this month.


