This month we celebrate Harvest – always a significant event in the life of our church and community. Both our church school and Springside School will hold services in church to mark this event and goods will be distributed to those in need within the locality.



The celebration of Harvest has its roots in the Jewish celebration of "Sukkot" also known as the Feast of the Tabernacles. Sukkot commemorates the forty-year period during which the children of Israel were wandering through the desert, living in temporary shelters – as God brought them out of the land of Egypt.

In contemporary Judaism, Sukkot is a week-long celebration of God's care and protection. This year it begins on Sunday 13 October which coincidentally is also the day we hold our Harvest Festivals.

The original Christian observance of a harvest type thanksgiving was kept in the early days of August when the first of the corn harvest was made into bread for the Eucharist. This was known as "loaf mass" or Lammas.

In 1863, the Revd. Robert Hawker – Vicar of Morwenstow in Cornwall – revisited the Lammas custom on the first Sunday in October. From that small incident, Christian historians regard that as the forerunner of our modern Harvest Festivals.

Today Harvest is observed throughout the nation as a form of thanksgiving for God's goodness and the produce of the earth. The Harvest collect mentions that the season should be used for

- The glory of God
- The relief of those in need
- Our own well-being.

As the chorus to the hymn "We plough the fields and scatter" says: "All good gifts around us are sent from heaven above, So thank the Lord, O thank the Lord for all His love"

May God bless us as we celebrate His goodness and share His gifts with others.

* Next year sees both the 10th anniversary of the creation of the United Benefice of Walmersley Road and 250 years since the parish of St.John was formed.

The main event at St.John with St.Mark's will be held over the weekend of June 6/7 with our Summer Fair and a Celebration Service to be attended by the Bishop of Manchester.

There will be a service to mark a decade of the Benefice in the autumn.

* A service of Holy Communion with hymns takes place at Burrswood House on the last Thursday of each month at 2.00pm. The residents and staff are always keen for people to join them at this service. Everyone is welcome to attend. An ecumenical group also visits Burrswood House and Limefield Court on a monthly basis for a short service. Once again anyone is welcome to join us. Please have a word with me for the exact dates.

* Please let a member of the ministry team know if anyone is ill and requires a home or hospital visit. At the heart of our ministry to the parish is pastoral care. This is not the exclusive concern of the clergy but part of each Christian's duty to love one another.

* Any enquiries about baptisms or weddings / marriage banns etc should be made at the Parish Office at St.John with St.Mark's Hall any Wednesday evening between 6.30-7.00.

* The Ministry Team consisting of all the Clergy, Licensed Readers and our Authorised Lay Minister meet every month – usually on the second Monday evening. If you have an issue that you would like us to discuss, please contact one of the team.

* The next meeting of the MOB – Men of the Benefice – takes place on Monday 28 October. We meet at The Towler from 8pm. It would be good to see some new recruits! * Porch Boxes are always in need of food items to meet their current demand. A box is available at the back of both churches. Items are also sometimes donated to the Booth Centre in Manchester – to where some of our harvest gifts will be donated this month. The Centre was previously based at Manchester Cathedral and aims to bring about positive change in the lives of people who are experiencing homelessness or at risk of homelessness - to help them plan for and realise a better future. Thanks to those who regularly support these worthy causes.

* Regular attenders to church are encouraged to join our planned giving scheme. If you would like to do so or would like some further information, please speak to one of the Treasurers or Wardens.

We enjoyed an illustrated talk by Jill Smith on "Amber, Resin and Jet" with samples to enjoy from Jill and other members. We look forward to 'part two' on 2 October when Jill will engage us again, this time with "Ivory, Jade and Soapstone".

In September 1909 a branch was formed here at Christ Church and we marked 110 years of work and witness. Firstly we shared an evening at Falshaw's who opened their doors especially for us – great fellowship, pies and, naturally, ice cream. A sung evensong was held in thanksgiving for members past, present and future and for all they have and will achieve. We thank member Dave who led, all who came and those who provided the almost obligatory "tea and cakes" afterwards. An especial thanks to members of the choir from St John with St Mark's who joined Tricia to lead our singing, with Geoff (another member) at the organ. Dave, in his homily, stressed the word "witness" encouraging us to continue faithfully for the next 110 years – not personally, we hope!

Sad to say, although there have been opportunities recently to worship and share fellowship with members of our wider Mothers' Union family, there have been few from our branch. New Archdeaconry President, Ruth Taylor was commissioned at the festival, held this year at St Anne Tottington. The Deanery Festival was hosted by members of St Mary the Virgin Bury where we afterwards shared a cake to mark 120 years of that branch.

Barbara and I were able to attend the annual celebration and General Meeting, held this year in Portsmouth. A lovely service in Portsmouth Cathedral was followed the next day by a very lively meeting. Worldwide President Sheran spoke enthusiastically about the future of Mothers' Union, four dioceses (two from the north – Liverpool and Durham) spoke of new initiatives in their area and the Reverend Barry Hill spoke of working hand in hand with clergy and the importance, in his eyes, of all we do to make a difference. Why not put the date in your diary for next year? – September 26th in Belfast. Also announced was the theme for 2020, "Building Hope and Confidence".

Find out more about Mothers' Union, especially in the Diocese of Manchester, by joining us at Church House, 90 Deansgate (just before Kendal's) on Saturday 12th October for our Council Meeting. Open to everyone, you will be most welcome. The meeting starts at 10am and finishes by about 2.30pm. Take a packed lunch as there is so much to do and see and there is plenty of tea and coffee on hand to keep you refreshed.

On Wednesday 16th we welcome Julie Lancaster, Bury Deanery Leader, to talk about her experiences since she became involved with the charity Nightstop.

At our 110th Thanksgiving service Dave chose to highlight just two of the initiatives in which we take part here at Christ Church, namely the Gift Bags given at baptisms and the Welcome Cards available for new neighbours. The offertory at the service was just over £55 which will be used for these and other Mothers' Union projects in the parish.

One presentation in Portsmouth was "Myths about Mothers' Union". Ask me if you do not already know the answers to this sample of myths:

- to join I need to be a mother
- only those baptised can become members
- I must attend branch meetings if I am a member
- the Vicar can decide who can belong

I am happy to discuss Mothers' Union with anyone, so please just ask.

UK Anti-Slavery Day is on 18th October and is an opportunity to raise awareness of modern slavery. What can we do? Maybe start with this reflection, based on the parable of the persistent widow in Luke 18:1-8.

There are five themes in this passage which can help us explore freedom, especially through the lens of Modern Slavery.

The Widow... a character controlled and exploited

This story offers a relevant insight into one of the great challenges to freedom in our times - the continuing growth of modern slavery.

In a complex and highly organised society, the widow represents someone whose place is totally dependent, someone who is under the control of others. A place of great vulnerability, always open to opportunities for exploitation. A place of silent suffering and restriction, hardly recognised by others, because of an apparently respectable, religiously endorsed term: 'widow'.

The same could be said for those designated as 'slave', in biblical times, but also in our own times. A term describing those largely hidden providers of the goods and services we are constantly encouraged to consume - the only issue being the price we are expected to pay. Like the widow in the story, so for us with those in forced labour, sexual exploitation, forced organ donation, organised begging, forced marriage, or those who have been groomed to carry drugs. The only concern for the rest of us is what price do I pay for services I want? How often do we ask, what price is paid by the providers of what I consume? The character who teaches from this parable is hidden, exploited, and controlled.

The Social Context

The Judge is a good representative of lives lived for selfish ends. He is indifferent to the plight of others, indifferent to the big questions of God, our purpose in creation, and judgement for justice. He is determined to live in his own safe world. What echoes do we see in lives lived online, in falsely cheerful Facebook pages, curated Instagram accounts, and anonymous Twitter feeds?

Connecting the Extremes

The Judge and the widow seem to be trapped in separate environments. One of 'the haves', the Judge is concerned just with his own wellbeing. The other, 'a have not', is trapped, invisible, frustrated, fearful.

These separate worlds prevent any proper understanding of justice, and can only be opened up to each other through prayer. The widow cries out continually: a prayer for justice. Her Hidden Voice eventually touches the Judge - he cannot be comfortable once the sound of such suffering begins to be heard. He listens. He is changed from selfish priorities to a concern to share freedom with this exploited and excluded pray-er.

A Challenge for Us

God grants justice to those who call out - this is the message of this Gospel. He does this by empowering the oppressed to call out, and by touching the hearts of the powerful to hear and respond. In our world today we have a moment of opportunity to be priests and mediators of this desperate human praying. We can teach ourselves to hear the Hidden Voices of the exploited and excluded of our own times - those in Modern Slavery being the most abused and vulnerable – and say we see you to those society has turned away from.

We can try to practice justice in our own dealings as consumers of services and ask the questions we have been encouraged to silence. More, we can play a key role in amplifying these Hidden Voices so that their prayers are better heard by those in power - in government, business, law enforcement, church and voluntary organisations, the media, and our own workplaces and community groups.

Do Something Now!

The Clewer Initiative has produced materials to enable all kinds of communities to learn about listening to and responding alongside Hidden Voices. Discerning the widows of our time and becoming agents of that 'praying always' that brings empowerment to the vulnerable, and a readjustment of perspective and practice to those in places of power. Visit the website, download the Safe Car Wash app, contact the team, and take the widow seriously! When the Son of Man comes, will He find such faith on earth?
