

Many of you will know that my major hobby is painting. I am no David Hockney but do get pleasure from the creative process. Every Monday I am to be found in the church hall alongside friends painting whatever I like, usually a landscape, with very little pressure and the time passes very quickly.

On Friday mornings I am a member of another Art group which has a tutor who sets us specific tasks, which means tackling something which may not have been a first choice of subject. Recently she asked us to make a picture with string, any or many types of string of a design of our choosing.

Now as an eight year old I was never any good at "Cut and Stick" and I am no better now that I am in my eighties. I managed to stick string to the table, my fingers together and pieces in totally the wrong place in my picture. But I persevered and the final result was a study in not fifty shades of grey but ten shades of brown. Alan suggested it was a good design for a carpet and one of my



friends made that telling comment "Well its different!"

I had definitely been taken out of my comfort zone.

Jesus went out of his comfort zone when he went into the wilderness, leaving behind friends and family and all that was familiar in his everyday life. He was hungry and alone and whilst there he was tempted three times by the devil. Once he was asked to turn stones into bread to satisfy his hunger, then asked to throw himself from the highest point of the temple so that the angels might save him. Both of these he refused to do and then when the devil offered to give Jesus all the kingdoms of the world if he would bow down and worship him, Jesus declined saying "Away from me. Satan! For it is written; worship the Lord your God and serve him only." (Matthew 4v 1-11) Jesus did not take the easy option to relieve his hunger, to demonstrate the power of God or to acquire all the kingdoms of the world. He remained faithful to his Father.

Lent is a time when we remember the temptation of Jesus and prepare ourselves to remember his passion and resurrection. We often do this by denying ourselves something, going without chocolate, wine or some other treat.

Although these acts may be a good discipline perhaps we should consider going outside our comfort zone in a more positive way, not denying ourselves but doing something extra, praying more, studying the bible more, attending Lent groups, taking steps to help others, putting our faith more into practice.

When I had finished my string picture there was a sense of satisfaction and achievement. Perhaps at the end of Lent, we may come to a greater understanding of Christ's sacrifice for each of us and experience the Easter celebration with a renewed sense of joy.

* Our Lent Study Groups looking at the influence of Abraham on modern day Christianity are meeting at two venues across the benefice. Monday evenings at 150 Walmersley Road beginning at 7.30pm and Thursday afternoons at Christ Church Hall starting at 2.00pm. We begin in the week commencing 2 March and continue for five weeks until the first week of April. Please join us at either of these weekly meetings during this important season.

* We are continuing the preparations for the 10th anniversary of the creation of the United Benefice of Walmersley Road and 250 years since the parish of St.John was formed, which are both celebrated this year. The main event at St.John with St.Mark's will be held over the weekend of June 6/7 with our Summer Fair and a Celebration Service to be attended by the Bishop of Manchester. On the Sunday evening there will be a short service on the site of the old Church at The Rock. Various services of celebrations for those who have significant occasions are being held during the year and details can be found elsewhere in this magazine. There will be a service to mark a decade of the Benefice at Christ Church on Sunday 25 October led by the Bishop of Bolton.

* Bury Parish Church are hosting a Confirmation Service on the morning of Sunday 14 June. If anyone would like to be confirmed on this occasion, please have a word with me. Preparation classes for prospective candidates will begin in April.

* A service of Holy Communion with hymns takes place at Burrswood House on the last Thursday of each month at 2.00pm. The residents and staff are always keen for people to join them at this service. Everyone is welcome to attend. An ecumenical group also visits Burrswood House and Limefield Court on a monthly basis for a short service. Once again anyone is welcome to join us. Please have a word with me for the exact dates.

* Please let a member of the ministry team know if anyone is ill and requires a home or hospital visit. At the heart of our ministry to the parish is pastoral care. This is not the exclusive concern of the clergy but part of each Christian's duty to love one another.

* Any enquiries about baptisms or weddings / marriage banns etc should be made at the Parish Office at St.John with St.Mark's Hall any Wednesday evening between 6.30-7.00.

* The Ministry Team consisting of all the Clergy, Licensed Readers and our Authorised Lay Ministers meet every month – usually on the second Monday evening. If you have an issue that you would like us to discuss, please contact one of the team.

* Porch Boxes are always in need of food items to meet their current demand. A box is available at the back of both churches.

* Regular attenders to church are encouraged to join our planned giving scheme. If you would like to do so or would like some further information, please speak to one of the Treasurers or Wardens.

* If you would like to donate towards the cost of the flowers in church, perhaps in memory of a loved one or in celebration of a special event, please speak to Betty Winterbottom (Christ Church) or Rosemarie Ashworth (St.John with St.Mark).

* Both of our Church Halls are available for a whole range of activities for use by church and community groups. Please however check with the bookings officers (June Banks for St.John with St.Mark and Jennifer Wood for Christ Church) if the building is otherwise occupied before anything is arranged.

St. John with St. Mark PCC meeting of 23rd January 2020

New CRB's have been approved for Pantomime helpers.

The Seder Meal will take place on Wednesday in Holy Week, 8th April, in the Church Hall. St. Stephen's will also be holding a separate one this year.

We had ordered some pens to mark the 250th Anniversary of the Parish of St. John however they have been received with incorrect wording. The company have said they will send us a new correct order. A service at the site of the old Church on The Rock will be held at 6.30pm on Sunday 7th June. We will meet at Sunny Avenue at 6.00pm and walk down. At the end of June, the Pantomime team will stage a Review. Also this year there will be special services to mark Church Weddings (19th July), Baptisms (27th September) & Funerals (1st November) - all Sundays at 3.00pm – to mark the anniversary. We will publicise these on social media and in the Bury Times.

A small group will be meeting on 30th January & 13th February to discuss the 'Church for a different world' suggestions from Café Church last year.

Makerfield have been chosen to fit the new sound system in Church. There will be new speakers, including two in the Chancel. The system will be I-Pad controlled and WIFI will be needed in Church. This will be installed during February.

The Christmas Fair raised £1627, Pantomime raised £600 and £460 went to the Bed for a Night Scheme on Walmersley Road from the loose collections at Christmas. The flexi-step needs repairing as a leg is damaged. This will be fixed however an insurance scheme also needs to be looked at going forward.

A suggestion to hold two separate Carol Services at each end of the Benefice has been raised as not everybody enjoys going out in the dark. One is likely to be in the afternoon and one in the evening. The Vicar mentioned that there would be a pulpit swap with the new minister from Seedfield Methodist on 26th January. Changes to electoral roll rules means that names will now only be removed at the annual review, but names can be added whenever. The roll will now not include addresses. It was also announced that the APCM can now be held up to the end of May, meaning the Archdeacon's Visitation will take place in June. Sidespeople will now be appointed by the PCC. A new middle curtain has been put up on the stage.

The next PCC meeting will be Thursday 5th March and the APCM will be Sunday 26th April.

Our MAP (Mission Action Plan)

In last month's edition of the magazine we began a series of articles focusing on our Mission Action Plan. You may have heard much about this topic, and over the last few months our PCCs have been devising a Mission Action Plan for where we see ourselves in 5 years time, helping us to form a growing, vibrant church, relevant to the communities of which we are a part. Some of these actions are specific to the individual Parishes, whereas others are being worked on as a joint Benefice.

We thought we would share in more detail the actions we set ourselves, with a description of the priority actions if we are to 'get there'. Each month we will focus on one particular subject and if you have **ANY** comments or suggestions then please share them with Clergy, Wardens or PCC members. **EVERYBODY** needs to be involved.

This month's theme focuses on the encouragement of more vocations to the lay and ordained ministries:

- Encourage laity to recognise and exercise their gifts and their callings. We will do this via:
 - 4 Café Church meetings in each Parish, encouraging congregational dialogue and interaction within a worship format
 - Monthly Sunday @ Seven services, allowing more spontaneous involvement from congregational members as well as leadership opportunities
 - \circ $\,$ Occasional sermons and articles in the magazine
 - Providing opportunities to the laity to exercise their gifts, giving encouragement and feedback when they do
- Prayerfully consider, identify and scope-out areas in need of ministry across the Benefice e.g. for ALM and OLM. Identify potential candidates and explore their willingness & readiness
- Nurture, support and explore the calling of any who feel drawn to ordained ministry
- Mindful of the likely numbers of ministers in the Benefice prayerfully review the weekly provision of church Services and creatively explore the role that lay ministry could play in any revised programme.

'Church for a Different World' – Café Church Suggestions



You may recall that last year both Churches held a Café Church service, which focussed on the Diocesan initiative 'Church for a Different World'. This involved you offering your comments and

suggestions on post-it notes for what we could do within both our churches to help us improve how we 'do things'.

Please rest assured that these suggestions have not been forgotten about! Shortly after the sessions, **ALL** your post-it notes were collated onto a spreadsheet and Vivienne Stone from the Christ Church congregation went through the list with initial thoughts and comments.

This was discussed at the Ministry team and PCC. Earlier this year it was then decided to set up a small group to go through the list in more detail and this small group met twice in January and February.

It is evident that there were some great thoughts and **EVERY ONE** was discussed in some way. There were over 60 suggestions altogether, some relevant to both churches and some specific to one rather than the other.

We are putting together some proposed next steps to be shared and discussed in due course. But it's been interesting to realise that some of the ideas have already been taken up. This includes sharing more personal stories via Sunday@Seven and Café Church; using more banners and notices to let people know what's happening and use of different liturgies.

This year marks the 10th anniversary of the Real Easter Egg. Since it was first launched in 2010 more than one million items have been sold with over £275,000 being raised for charitable causes.



Out of the 80 million chocolate Easter eggs purchased each year, the Real Easter Egg is the only one which has an Easter story booklet in the box.

The 2020 range features a set of anniversary designs. The original egg costs £3.99 and the Special Edition £9.99. There is also a dark chocolate alternative for £5.50. All of the chocolate is palm oil free and Fairtrade certified. For 2020 the egg packaging is now plastic free.

The Real Easter Egg is available in four ways:

* at the TraidCraft stall in Church

* by people buying directly from The Meaningful Chocolate Company (please see forms in church).

Why not donate an egg directly to a Foodbank too? Check out the website <u>https://meaningfulchocolate.co.uk/</u>

* from independent retailers, such as Traidcraft, Embrace the Middle East, Christian bookshops.

* from supermarkets. Tesco, Morrisons, Waitrose and ASDA will have stocks from the middle of February but only in their larger stores and in limited quantities. This helps to encourage supermarkets to continue stocking the Egg and helps to spread the Easter story to thoe who may not hear it in church.


