As we go to press, the advice regarding the Coronavirus outbreak is changing daily. In the meantime we continue to follow guidance from the Church of England (*see below*), the Diocese and the Government.

This means that for the foreseeable future there will be no services or meetings held in physical gatherings.

The Vicar continues to say Morning and Evening Prayer in church from Mondays to Thursdays. Morning Prayer will now be said at Christ Church at 9.30am with Evening Prayer at 5pm at St John with St Mark. Anyone is very welcome to join him, observing the suggested hygiene protocols. Both churches will be open 10am – 12noon on Sundays.

We shall use our websites, social media and, of course, word of mouth to keep everyone informed.

Public worship suspended to help stem spread of coronavirus

The Archbishops of Canterbury and York are calling for Church of England churches to put public worship on hold and become a “different sort of church” in the coming months to face the challenge of coronavirus.



In a joint letter, Archbishops Justin Welby and John Sentamu said it was now necessary to put public services on hold until further notice. But they said that far from having to “shut up shop”, the Church of England must face the challenge by becoming a radically different kind of church rooted in prayer and serving others. It comes after the Government announced unprecedented peacetime measures to try to control the spread of the virus, with restrictions on public gatherings, transport and working.

The Archbishops expressed the desire that church buildings may, where practical, remain open as places of prayer for the community, observing social distancing recommendations.

They also invited clergy to maintain the ancient pattern of daily prayer and, where possible, the eucharist – live streaming their worship if they have the resources to do so.

And they urged congregations to be in the forefront of providing practical care and support for the most poor and the most vulnerable during the crisis.

“Being a part of the Church of England is going to look very different in the days ahead,” they wrote. “Our life is going to be less characterised by attendance at church on Sunday, and more characterised by the prayer and service we offer each day. We may not be able to pray with people in the ways that we are used to, but we can certainly pray for people. And we can certainly offer practical care and support.

“Please do carry on supporting the local foodbank and buy extra provisions for it. Ensure the night shelters wherever possible are kept open. There are many very encouraging schemes happening right across our country in communities to focus on caring for the most vulnerable and do continue to play your part in those.

“Then by our service, and by our love, Jesus Christ will be made known, and the hope of the gospel – a hope that can counter fear and isolation - will spread across our land.”

They added: “This is a defining moment for the Church of England. Are we truly are a church for all, or just the church for ourselves. We urge you sisters and brothers to become a different sort of church in these coming months: hopeful and rooted in the offering of prayer and praise and overflowing in service to the world.”

The archbishops have joined other church leaders in calling for a day of prayer and action this Sunday, 22 March (Mothering Sunday), particularly remembering those who are sick or anxious and all involved in health and emergency services.

Further information on what the suspension of public worship will mean will be available on the Church of England website where there is a specific “coronavirus” page which will be regularly updated.

When I was a child, I used to imagine God as a rather fearful old man with a great big book with all the naughty things I had done written in it and that I'd have to answer to him about them when I died.

The real significance of Good Friday didn't exist. It was just a very sad day when Jesus was crucified by horrid people. I grew up, added more stuff to the list, then in my late twenties I changed from a church goer to a committed Christian. As you might say – the pieces of the Jigsaw fell into place. The whole truth of Jesus taking our wrongdoings, being our scapegoat, and what it physically cost him was realised. There was a way to God and he had thrown the book away! It was through Jesus that we had our 'get out of jail' card. But he lost his life to do it!

Oh no he didn't!

He came back to life on the third day as the song so expressively puts it 'bursting forth in glorious day up from the grave he rose again!' no passive meandering in the garden, he was back with a purpose! And that purpose was to let everyone know that they have a second chance for a good life, living the Kingdom! The Kingdom that we are all invited to, the one where love rules supreme, heaven on earth!

In April, and this song, we have the two extremes of deep despair and great joy - Good Friday and Easter Sunday morning. Some people call me a 'Happy Clappy' Christian but I know how much it cost Jesus to get rid of my entries in the big book and I am eternally grateful to him.

It begs me to ask you all 'what song is it that Jesus has put into your life?'

From the Vicarage

* The announcement on St.Patrick's Day from the Archbishops of Canterbury & York that church services should be suspended due to the coronavirus pandemic means that much of our activities this month and beyond will be curtailed.

This means that there will be no Sunday or mid-week services, Lent Groups, Seder Meal or other public activities for the foreseeable future.

It is possible that events publicised in this magazine will be cancelled. Please keep in touch via our church websites or through the emails / phone calls that you may receive.

During this crisis I intend to continue saying Evening Prayer at 5.00pm in the chapel of St John with St Mark on a daily basis (excluding Friday). In addition, I will be saying Morning Prayer at Christ Church on the same days at 9.30am. Subject to the recommended hygiene protocols **YOU ARE WELCOME TO JOIN ME.**

Pastoral Care will continue but must by necessity be subject to the suggested health and hygiene restrictions. This may mean more phone contact than personal visiting.

In a letter by our Diocesan Bishops they state that: "Over the coming weeks, the Church of England will be very much "open for business" but it will not be "business as usual". We will pray, and we will serve our communities, loving God and our neighbour, but we should not seek to gather in our customary numbers."

* Please let a member of the ministry team know if anyone is ill and requires a home or hospital visit. At the heart of our ministry to the parish is pastoral care. This is not the exclusive concern of the clergy but part of each Christian's duty to love one another.

* Any enquiries about baptisms or weddings / marriage banns etc should be made at the Parish Office at St.John with St.Mark's Hall any Wednesday evening between 6.30-7.00.

* The Ministry Team consisting of all the Clergy, Licensed Readers and our Authorised Lay Ministers meet every month – usually on the second Monday evening. If you have an issue that you would like us to discuss, please contact one of the team.

* Porch Boxes are always in need of food items to meet their current demand. A box is available at the back of both churches.

* Regular attenders to church are encouraged to join our planned giving scheme. If you would like to do so or would like some further information, please speak to one of the Treasurers or Wardens.

* After over 25 years of arranging flowers in Christ Church, Betty Winterbottom has decided to retire from this role. I would like to thank Betty on behalf of everyone at Christ Church for her sterling service. Hazel Bamford has agreed to take over this position for which I am very grateful. She can be contacted on 797 2136. If you would like to donate towards the cost of the flowers in church, perhaps in memory of a loved one or in celebration of a special event, please speak to Hazel (Christ Church) or Rosemarie Ashworth (St.John with St.Mark).

* Both of our Church Halls are available for a whole range of activities for use by church and community groups. NOTES FROM OUR COUNCILS

From a meeting of Christ Church PCC on 24th February 2020

1. The remedial electrical work on the church hall has still to be completed. The contractor is to be contacted to determine a date.
2. The December brass band concert was discussed and it was agreed that we would also invite the singer to return.
3. As a result of the Parish share meeting with the diocesan representatives, it was agreed by the PCC that the parish share for Christ Church for the next three years would be £27,000, £29,000 and £31,000.
4. The vicar had received revised information on the number of synod representatives based on the number of people on our electoral roll and our representation remains at 3.
5. A letter was received from the Bishop of Manchester regarding the Church and Coronavirus, dealing with matters of Pastoral practice and hygiene in church during the current situation.
6. The treasurer submitted draft financial accounts for 2019 and these were approved by the PCC for forwarding to the Examiner. These will be finally approved by the PCC after they have been examined prior to inclusion in the APCM report.
7. The celebration to mark ten years of the Walmersley Road Benefice will take place on the 25th October 2020 at 10.30am. The service will take place at Christ Church Walmersley and will be attended by the Bishop of Bolton. The Archdeacon and Seedfield Methodists have also been invited.
8. A discussion was held regarding the church noticeboards. The secretary was asked to contact the council regarding the required size of the boards and to follow up on planning permission requirements. A faculty would be required once the question of planning permission was settled.
9. A new hire agreement for the church hall is being reviewed and will be circulated to all hall users by the 15th of March 2020.
10. The question of copyright licences was discussed by the PCC and all PCC members were made aware of our current licences and what we are not able to copy without infringing copyright.

The next PCC meeting will be after the APCM on the 20th April 2020

NOTES FROM OUR COUNCILS

St. John with St. Mark PCC meeting of 5th March 2020

We have five CRB's outstanding for church people and activities.

There is a coffee morning & book fair on Saturday 4th April and the Seder meal will take place on Wednesday 8th April.

Website update – It would seem that Monday & Tuesday are the busiest days for people viewing the website. The presumption is because sermons are published online on the Sunday.

We are awaiting better weather before we can progress jobs outstanding from the Quinquennial inspection.

We are considering putting a lock on the power supply to the disabled lift and Ian is also looking at service quotes.

Items are still coming in for the 250th Anniversary display. For the occasion we are going to use a logo designed by two children from our day school.

A sub-committee met twice to discuss the Café Church 'Church for a Different World' suggestions and a list of actions will be discussed at the ministry meeting on 6th April.

The new Church sound system was installed in February. Early opinions are that the sound is much clearer and louder.

We only have three spaces on Deanery Synod from this year. Whoever takes these places on will need to be prepared to travel further afield due to the Deanery reorganisation. It was noted that no Deanery Synod representative can now serve more than 2 terms, which all the existing reps have.

There is an ongoing situation with Covid-19. This was discussed at the meeting however circumstances are changing daily. It was agreed that we create a list of contact details for the congregation so we can get in touch with them at the last minute if services and events have to change.

Recent expenditures and incomes were noted. The coffee morning in February raised £300. Any comments or corrections to the PCC report need to be communicated to Ian & Jun before the APCM.

Debbie spoke about the Pantomime following a meeting with the Vicar and other helpers.

We need to clear the path alongside the Garden of Remembrance following the decision to move the Memorial area. This is now very mossy and therefore a hazard. Anybody who uses the steps up into the loft is asked to ensure the door is locked after use.

The APCM is on Sunday 26th April at 12noon. Anybody who has not yet submitted an annual organisation report is asked to complete these ASAP.

Resources as we change the way we worship

With shutdowns and restricted movement taking place due to Covid-19 we are not going to be able to worship with one another in the way that we are normally used to. Although we will be looking to keep the church open for prayer, we know it won't be the same as our usual gathering together. So we have been looking for some resources you can access from home.

If you are able to access the internet there are very, very many options. So PLEASE help those who do not have this lifeline – perhaps by printing some items out for them.

Set aside a period each day, or several

- * you may find it helpful to have a specific place;
- * maybe light a candle, to help you focus;
- * perhaps use a holding cross if you have one;
- * but above all be comfortable and at ease.



Just a suggestion

- * Ask God to help you remember he's there with you.
- * Say the prayer Jesus taught his disciples, "Our Father"
- * Give thanks for the day (if you feel able)
- * Read a bible passage – slowly. Now read it again.
- * What phrase or word stands out for you? Why?
- * Choose one point which has registered with you and pray about it.
- * Look toward tomorrow. What do you expect the day to hold?
- * Ask God to help you remember he is with you.

Services of daily prayer are available on the Church of England website <https://www.churchofengland.org/prayer-and-worship/join-us-service-daily-prayer>. There are services of Daily Prayer in both contemporary and traditional forms and for all times of day. Once you get to the page, click the 'More Options' link to filter by date, time of day and form of service. Also on the site you can read or hear a daily prayer. If you have a smartphone why not download and use the "Daily Prayer" app? It is free to download from the usual sources.

Creative Ways of Praying

- * You might find it helpful to listen to favourite hymns or worship songs, or other pieces of music that have a special meaning for you.
- * Pictures can help prompt our prayers - for instance photos of loved ones, maps or pictures of our community or the wider world
- * If the news is getting you down, try praying for the people and situations that are mentioned.
- * Why not try doodling, painting, or drawing as you pray?

The BBC Radio 4 Daily Service & Sunday Service

Most of us can access these but again, if you are able to go online you will find a number of previous services too.

A Sermon for every Sunday

This is a really great website where, as the name suggests, you can see and hear Sermons for every Sunday. These are delivered by a number of different preachers, some of them very well known. 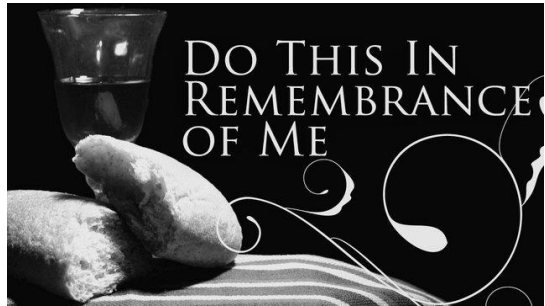

- f) Continue the single-day visits with St Joseph's to Formby Prayer Centre

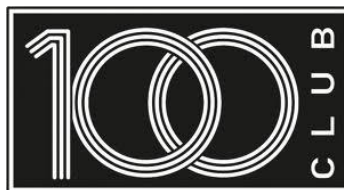

Generous giving

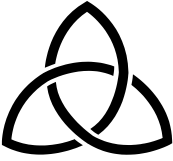

Wood Street Mission
