### Dear Friends

By now, wild fruit foragers and gardeners have prepared and stashed away nature's bounty; closed freezer doors on damson, plum, blackberries, raspberries, apples and perhaps a little rhubarb on the side. A time to remember sunny days between



showers and downpours before winter sets in.

In a way it's a sombre time in Church life as everything we have worked through as a pilgrim people is coming to its conclusion. The month of November signals the end of the long Trinity season. On All Saints' Day we celebrate the Christian saints - known and unknown – followed by All Souls on 2 November where names of loved ones are often read aloud in church, brought to mind but not forgotten.

On 11 November – the anniversary of the armistice that ended hostilities in the war of 1914 -18 - is a day of Remembrance for the nation where we pay our respects to the fallen of all wars since. The events at the Cenotaph in London and in countless towns and villages across the country mark this event.

Some of you may had a recent experience of losing a family member or friend in the uniformed services, but for most of us it will be an inherited memory on a plaque passed on from one generation to the next.

And yet there is hope in this Kingdom Season, four weeks before Advent, when we celebrate the risen life of Christ the King on 22 November.

Take a look again, if you will, at the famous picture painted by the pre-Raphaelite painter William Holman Hunt based on Revelation 3:20 "Behold, I stand at the door, and knock".



Jesus is represented as Christ the King. The Light of the World. He is dressed in a long royal robe and crowned with a crown of gold woven through with sharp thorns. This is a reminder of our Saviour's sacrifice on the cross of Calvary for the love of all people. He stands before a closed door overgrown with weeds. Christ knocks on the door of the soul. His invitation is simple – take me seriously and include me in your life. The handle of the door is on our side.

The Lantern that Jesus carries will enlighten our hearts and minds. He will show us the way – all we

need to do is ask Christ the King to enter in. If we do this, in the words of Julian of Norwich: "All shall be well, and all shall be well, and all manner of things shall be well". Even in these difficult times.

#### St. John with St. Mark

The meeting took place in Church after the 11.00am service on 18th October, ensuring the necessary health and hygience protocols were observed. The wardens and deputy wardens were elected at the start of the meeting. The policies on children, young people and the safeguarding of adults were approved in the usual manner.

Ian outlined his treasurers report, noting for the first time in years it was not displayed on an overhead projector! We ended 2019 in deficit however this was largely due to our expenditure on positive things such as the disabled access between Church and Hall. Ian also informed us how much of an impact the pandemic has had on our finances during 2020, due to planned givers shielding and hall usage down, and how things could play out if the current situation continues for the longer term.

The 250th anniversary of the Parish of St. John formed the basis of the Vicar's report and how our mission had been curtailed, due to the various events which were planned more or less all being cancelled. It was noted that the celebration with Bishop David on 6th December will go ahead though. The Vicar also thanked those who had made it possible for the Church to reopen for public worship and there were particular thanks to Ian and June for their work in both Church and Hall.

A brief meeting of the PCC took place after the meeting to elect officers to roles and to approve the renewal of the current Eucharist Assistants (although currently not being used due to communion restrictions). David Robinson

#### **Christ Church**

A socially distanced meeting was attended by 20 Parishioners.

The Minutes of the APCM held on the 29<sup>th</sup> April 2019 were approved. The vicar thanked the treasurer for her monthly reports by email over the last difficult months. Alistair Gillian was approved as independent examiner for 2020/2021. There were 82 members on the electoral roll at the time of the APCM.

Thanks were given by the vicar for Betty Winterbottom's work over the years in looking after the flower arranging in church and organising a rota of flower arrangers. Betty retired at Easter in 2020 and Hazel Bamford has taken over from her.

The current wardens were re-elected, the vicar giving thanks for their work over the year. Two PCC members stood down and three existing members were re-elected. *Continued on page 26..* 

The Diocese of Manchester has a desire

"TO BE A WORSHIPPING, GROWING & TRANSFORMING CHRISTIAN PRESENCE AT THE HEART OF OUR COMMUNITY."

To this end, a recently published document points the way to work together in growing, nurturing and serving our communities across the Diocese.

Transforming Manchester Diocese: A briefing document on the proposals for Mission Communities (MCs) was issued last month.

It introduces a system of MCs whereby groups of parishes are linked to bring together the skills and talents of ordained and lay leaders in a particular locality.

It is not designed to abandon the parish structure but to enhance it by working alongside others to develop mission and ministry.

As Bishop David writes: "Over the last seven months, we have shown that we can respond positively, even in the most challenging of circumstances, when we have been tired and frustrated at the restrictions placed upon us and hurt by being deprived of our normal ways of gathering. We have learned we can do church differently in new and creative ways. We have understood better what it is to be church outside our existing walls and buildings, which has enabled us to release new missional energy. And we have found new ways of working together and supporting each other. All this is enabling us to move forward under God."

The Mission Communities proposals follow the creation of seven large deaneries to replace the previous smaller groupings. MCs are part of the way this new deanery structure aims to achieve this vision for the future.

A consultation period will now begin to look at all of the details and for this to be widely discussed and debated over the next eight months. This will enable a wide range of people across the diocese to be involved in shaping this vision and enthusiastically engage with what this will mean for their church communities. The document is published on the diocesan website – www.manchester.anglican.org Please have a read of the proposals and direct any comments to a member of our Ministry Team or a Deanery Synod member.

The Diocese sees Mission Communities as being at the heart of their vision for local ministry.

The publication includes this prayer for the Diocese:

Living and Loving God, as your pilgrim people in the Diocese of Manchester, we thank you for the great commission with which you have entrusted us: to love and serve, and to bring our parishes, schools, chaplaincies and all our communities into new life in Jesus Christ. As we prepare for all you call us towards in the months and years to come, grant us hopeful and honest discernment; meet our anxieties, griefs and fears with your tender and comforting Spirit; and help us to greet the promise and challenge of each new day with openness, grace, and trust. Teach us to pray in faith, hope and love, that we may go out into your world confident in your mission, and full of the Good News of Jesus Christ. Amen



Christian care for families

I hope you did not miss the new venture of uploading Thursday Prayer to Manchester's new YouTube channel. Thursday Prayer is held on the second Thursday of each month and is a monthly short service, led by different deaneries through the year. It used to take place in the Cathedral before moving to the chapel in 90 Deansgate, either of which is difficult for many of our members. The pandemic has resulted in a decision to make these recordings. The next one will go live at noon on November 12 with the theme of Remembrance. For those not able to access YouTube we distributed the words of the service. Please let me know if you would like a copy in future.

Manchester Mothers' Union book of reflections on the pandemic is now available. A small donation would be welcome. Tricia and I have copies if anyone wishes to see it before ordering. Also now on sale for £5 is "Food and Fellowship" – a selection of recipes and graces for all occasions from around the world. Hilary Riddick will be happy to get you a copy.

Another first was holding the AGM and Autumn Council by Zoom. This worked well and hopefully we can look forward to more people joining us for the Spring Council.

As I write we are anticipating a Virtual Gathering "Building Hope and Confidence in a Covid World" – an opportunity to hear stories from across the movement. Although it will have taken place when you read this it will still be available online and on YouTube and promises to be interesting as well as informative.



Another knitting request – please ask if you would like the instructions. It is very quick and easy but the chaplaincy at Salford Royal has asked for more rainbows as they have had such a positive response from patients.

Stay safe Bob Taylor (Branch Leader) A year ago, Elaine and I had an experience that mirrored to some degree an incident that took place in the early church. At one point in the growth of the early church, the Apostle Paul and his team were planting churches when they were stopped in their tracks. They had intended to go into the Roman province of Asia (modern day Turkey) but the Holy Spirit stopped them. Then they tried to go east into Bithynia but again the Spirit of Jesus would not allow them. Finally, Paul had a vision of a Macedonian man asking "come over to Macedonia and help us." You can read about the incident in Acts 16. This brought the message about Jesus to Europe from the Middle East.

In July last year, Elaine stepped down from her post as Director of Maths at Bury CE High School. In September, a friend from church invited Elaine to accompany her when she went out to Nepal. Elaine did some teacher training and supported the friend as she spoke at a women's conference. Meanwhile circumstances conspired to bring my time as Head of Bury CE High School to an end. This felt like I was prevented from carrying on with what seemed the obvious next step just like the Apostle Paul being prevented from going into the Roman province of Asia, which was his obvious next step continuing the work he had been doing.

I then started to seek out what I should do next. I explored roles in Church education and in various Church of England posts, all of which should have fitted me very well. None of these roles developed into anything and it again felt like Paul's experience of trying to go in another direction but finding he was not allowed to proceed. For him, as for me, it was because it was the wrong direction.

At Christmas, Elaine received a phone call from her friend to ask us to go round for coffee and a piece of Christmas cake. The reason for the invite was that a family had arrived from Nepal. Elaine had met the husband briefly when she was there. We went round and met this man from Nepal. In our discussions, he said "Why don't you come over to Nepal and help us?"

This started a train of thought that led to him sending us an invitation to apply to work in a Christian study centre in Kathmandu. The centre needed a new director who had experience of Primary and Secondary education, who had done some international work, who had provided teacher training in an international context and who knew how to develop a specifically Christian educational setting. It was as though the role had been written for me. They also had need of a Secondary mathematics teacher and someone who had senior leadership experience so they could take over the recruitment work for the centre. This fitted Elaine too, like a glove.

We, like Paul, determined that God was calling us to go to Nepal to share the love of Christ through education. However, it is always wise to get God to confirm such things so we decided that we would apply to work with the Church Mission Society. If they took us on, we would have had the call confirmed. After an extensive process of applications and interviews, we were accepted as Mission Associates by the Church Mission Society. And so we will be leaving for Nepal as soon as the current situation allows. In the mean time, we are both already working for the Kathmandu International Study Centre (KISC). Elaine is teaching Maths and I am running things as best I can over the internet. Truly working from home!!



So what is KISC all about?

The centre was originally set up to provide some sort of education for the children of Christian Mission workers who started to come into Nepal after its boarders opened

up in 1950. At that time there were no known Christian Nepalis in the country. Today there is at least 1.4% of the population who are Christian and it is thought that the percentage is as high as 10%. After Hinduism and Buddhism, it is the third largest religion in the country. The church growth has been one of the most rapid in the world, a bit like the days of the early church. Nepal is one of the poorest countries in the world and its education service is in its early days. There is a need to develop education further to provide Nepalis with good quality teaching and learning. To do this, there is a need for a good quality teacher training programme. KISC recognised this and has develop a teacher training section called EQUIP which provides `in service' training for schools across Nepal.

Today, the children of Christian Mission workers are still the majority in both the Primary and the Secondary school, but they have been joined by children from the growing Nepali church too. Like a church school in England, there are also students and staff who are not yet Christian but who want an English curriculum education in a Christian ethos for themselves or their children. This all provides an opportunity to help the people of Nepal to develop an education service to rival that of more developed countries, which will enable the country to grow and flourish. It also provides an opportunity to educate the Nepali church leaders of tomorrow, and to demonstrate the love of Christ whilst doing so to the wider community. Finally, it allows for the training of Nepali teachers to enable them to deliver better quality learning which will give a better future and hope to the children in their care.

All of this is incredibly exciting but it will only happen with your support. We need people who will pray for KISC and who will pray for us too. Neither of us is youthful, so we expect the physical challenges to be a bit more noticeable than they would have been had we done this twenty years ago. Then there is the challenge of negotiating the bureaucracy of Nepal to get visas and work permits, not to mention the need to find accommodation and adjust to a very different way of life with its own distinctive culture. We need folk who will be prepared to encourage us and the work of KISC in demonstrating the love of Christ in Nepal.

Do you remember Thursday Light Lunches? We hope you do! It seems a long time since we had the pleasure of serving up meals in the church hall – February 2020 was the last one. That was eight months ago!

Covid has turned our world upside down over those months – and continues to do so. All that we used to do; all our regular activities; all that we took for granted as part of our lives; so much taken away, perhaps never to return – or at least not in the same format as before. Whilst the hospitality business has re-opened on our high streets unfortunately we have not felt able to follow suit with Thursday Light Lunch.

Thursday Lunch is not just about providing a meal – it's a social occasion where friends, old and new, meet to enjoy each other's company; to catch up, chat and reminisce; to laugh and joke together. We don't think that can be done sitting at separate tables, two metres apart, spaced through the main room in the church hall. It is also difficult, if not impossible, for those in the kitchen to prepare meals under Covid secure conditions.

So, for now, Thursday Light Lunch remains closed. We will be back as soon as we can. **We miss you.**





The Child Protection policy was ratified and Cath Hilton was reappointed as Child Protection and Safeguarding Officer.

In the vicar's remarks he touched on what a bizarre year it had been, with the church shut in lockdown and at one point only open for private prayer. There were many similarities in the situations and problems facing Christ Church today as were written into a brochure issued in the early 2000's by Brian Stannard, the then vicar.
