Playing by the Rules

July 19th 2021 - Freedom Day - the day the last of the rules imposed upon us because of the Covid epidemic were withdrawn. The rule book ripped up. All those rules which have restricted our behaviours for well over twelve months were gone!

Well, those rules may have gone - for now at least - but actually our lives have, since humans started living in community, always been subject to rules; and will no doubt continue to be so. Our society operates within a framework of rules; many enshrined in law; many based on common practice and tradition. Wherever we go, whatever we do, there is an accepted expectation that we will play by the rules. School rules, work-place rules, rules of the road, sports rules, church rules - the list is endless.

For the most part we accept that rules are necessary and we abide by them as part and parcel of what we do and how we behave. Having said that, I suspect that we all have a list of rules which we find irritating, restrictive and downright unacceptable. There are also rules which are almost expected to be bent and some which are regularly ignored!

As Christians I suppose it's not unreasonable for us to look to Jesus and his view on rules to give us some guidance on our own attitude to rule keeping.

When it comes to rules the Ten Commandments, given by God to Moses, are foundational as far as Jesus is concerned. Indeed Jesus was particularly unequivocal that the first commandment - to love the Lord your God - closely followed by love your neighbour as your self - underpin everything else. Read about that in Matthew 22 or Mark 12.

Jesus was once asked directly about his attitude to the tax rules - Matthew 22, Mark 12 and Luke 20 tell the story. As a retired tax gatherer I have always felt a bit of an inner glow when Jesus seems to affirm that we should pay our dues. Tax avoidance schemes were out of the question!

However when reading the gospels there does seem to be one rule book which Jesus was not too keen on - the multitude of rules set by the religious authorities. There are numerous instances of clashes between Jesus and those who seemed to want to enhance their own position by having rules which only they 'religiously' kept. The rules about what you could or could not do on the Sabbath particularly raised the hackles. Read Matthew 12 and Luke 13. The Six Woes listed in Luke 11 v 37-54 have strong words from Jesus to those who (over) loved the rule book!

Playing by the rules is always going to be a tricky pathway. Navigating our way through an ever increasing number of rules will never be easy - especially when the rules keep changing. I have to admit that I still have great difficulty with the off-side rule in football! Rules have provided hours of talking points over a pint of bitter or a glass of wine - and I'm sure will long continue to do so!

What I do feel sure of is that life (unfortunately?) needs rules. The Bible tells us that God set out hoping we could do without them but his hopes were dashed early on in the Garden of Eden. So he gave Moses the Ten Commandments and Jesus endorses that we use them as our foundation. Jesus also endorses a direct relationship with our Heavenly Father and any rules which hinder that relationship should be treated with caution.

Freedom Day? Perhaps that day comes when we do as Jesus says at John 8 v 31/32 "If you continue in my word, you are truly my disciples; and you will know the truth, and the truth will make you free."

* As we went to print, news of the death of Arthur Smith was announced aged 106. He died at Starmount Villa Care Home on Saturday 21 August. He had lived there since September 2020. We thank God for Arthur's life of service. There will be a tribute to him in next month's magazine.

* The further easing of restrictions in July meant a difference in our church services. The Ministry Team decided the following:

- Congregational Singing could go ahead
- Test & Trace information should no longer be gathered
- Wine to be offered within the distribution of Holy Communion
- Mask wearing and distancing issues to be no longer compulsory
- We should continue to share the peace in a non-physical way

Any further changes will be implemented as and when we feel able to do so. As with society in general, there are a variety of opinions about this process, and no one should feel compelled to do anything they are uncomfortable with. Please have a word with me if there any concerns.

* From this month, we are continuing our pre-Covid pattern of having a non-Communion service at St.John with St.Mark on the THIRD Sunday of each month. On those days there will be a service of Holy Communion at 8.30am.

This will take place IN CHURCH.

* Thanks to those who have helped tidy the churchyard at Christ Church in recent weeks. A group of willing volunteers meet each Thursday morning for a couple of hours and any further help would be most welcome.

* Congratulations to Ian Banks who was licensed as a Lay Reader at a service in Manchester Cathedral in July. Please pray for Ian as he begins this new ministry and I thank him for his commitment and willingness to join our Team of Readers.

* The Parish Office is open every Wednesday evening between 6.30-7.00pm at St.John with St.Mark Church Hall. This can be for enquiries about baptisms or weddings or any other matter.

* Porch Boxes are always in need of food and toiletries especially in this current situation. A box is available at the back of both churches. If you shop at Tesco Bury and are given blue tokens at the checkout, please use them at the Tesco Community Grant Scheme display on your way out to support Porch Box. The more that go in their slot, the more grant Tesco will give them!

* We hope to be able to provide tea and coffee after each 10.30am service from this month. If you would like to help with this, please contact one of the churchwardens. Both churches will use the back of the building to give out refreshments.

* The Ministry Team consisting of all the Clergy, Licensed Readers and our Authorised Lay Minister meet every month – usually on the second Monday evening. If you have an issue that you would like us to discuss, please contact one of the team.

* Regular attenders to church are encouraged to join our planned giving scheme. If you would like to do so or would like some further information, please speak to one of the Treasurers.

* Nick White – the son of Pauline White from Christ Church – is running the London Marathon next month, to raise funds for Oasis Community Learning who run schools as part of wider community Hubs. They provide young people and their families with the support they need in order to thrive in often very challenging circumstances. Further details about how to donate are on the CCW website. Alternatively, please contact Pauline or myself.

In early August our group met for the first time since March 2020. Publicised as 3 C's (Communion, Conversation, Cakes) there were a good number at the service of Holy Communion with member Dave presiding; with most moving over to the Hall afterwards for tea, coffee and homemade cakes. As I write we are looking forward to a light-hearted general knowledge quiz this week.

The group was represented at the Bolton Archdeaconry Festival on Mary Sumner Day. The preacher was the Revd Simon Cook, the new Area Dean of Bolton, who asked us "if we are ready" – the reading being of the wise and foolish virgins, only some of whom were ready when the bridegroom came.



Our meetings in September will allow us to continue our diocesan initiative to "Let's Chat" as we come together again to enjoy fellowship.

On 1 September we are invited to talk briefly (or simply listen as others share) about "a favourite . . ." – be that an object, a photo, a holiday, a piece of music, ????

Thursday Prayers on YouTube on 9 September will focus on Creation and will be available from noon.

We meet again on 15 September – we await confirmation of the content.

We shall gather with members from across the diocese, at Manchester Cathedral on Saturday, 18 September at 2.30pm, for a Service of Thanksgiving as we near the end of this Triennium.

The Annual Gathering (previously known as the General Meeting) will be held this year virtually so will be far more accessible to us all. There will be sessions from 11am – 12.30pm and 1.30 – 2.30 pm. This is a great way to listen to stories of the work of Mothers' Union worldwide and to hear from our CEO and Worldwide President among others. Please ask if you would like more details.

Bury CAP Debt Centre – serving the debt burdened poor in Bury

CAP is the shortened name for Christians Against Poverty.

We are 'against' poverty because Jesus came to bring good news for the poor, and to set the captives free (Luke 4:16-19). As Christ's followers we follow his call to seek justice and righteousness, care for the poor and needy, and show God's love to those ignored and set apart from 'normal' society by distress and deprivation.

CAP aims to help people who are trapped in a debt hole and need help to get out of it. Such people are often invisible in our communities. Our local CAP debt centre is available to help people in our area (currently Bury, Radcliffe, Whitefield and Prestwich).

Our centre was set up in 2019 by Churches Together in Bury, and has seen over 50 referrals since then, from social workers, the job centres, the supporting families team, various charities, health centres, churches and elsewhere.

Those being referred often face serious difficulties, whether these be the fallout from a broken relationship, unemployment, illness, abuse or other unexpected bad news. Children are often affected. We (i.e. the churches in Bury) choose to stand with them at a time in their lives when everything seems hopeless.

We play an important part in helping people regain self-esteem and confidence, by stabilising their finances, and providing options for dealing with their debts. All this takes place in a non-judgemental way, along with friendly, practical and emotional support.

There is no quick fix when working with a client, but our hope is that by the end clients will know that God and the local church loves them, and that many of the financial burdens on their shoulders will have been lifted.

Can you help?

We can't do this work without the support of local churches and Christians. Our small team of volunteers attend meetings with the debt coach when he sees clients. The small prayer team of volunteers diligently pray for clients. The whole work is overseen by a small charity called The Bury Project, whose committed trustees ensure that governance of the charity continues in the right way.

If you feel the Lord is prompting you to volunteer in some way, we would love to hear from you.

It is not cheap to run the debt centre. We offer clients a completely free service, and our annual budget is about £16,000/year with nearly half being our annual subscription to CAP headquarters in Bradford, where over 100 skilled people work. The subscription pays for the professional debt advice, and a multitude of other things which helps to make CAP so highly regarded in the debt world.



Creating hope, building a future.

Currently The Bury Project is facing a funding shortfall because many churches have been unable to make contributions because their own incomes have been seriously affected by the pandemic lockdowns.

We would therefore encourage people who are able to, to support us financially. Small amounts in the Lord's economy are as valuable as large ones (Mark 12:41-44). For example a standing order of just £1/month would help to pay for the printed materials we give to a client. Every pound we receive will help to find a pathway out of debt for a client. Donations can be gift-aided as well!

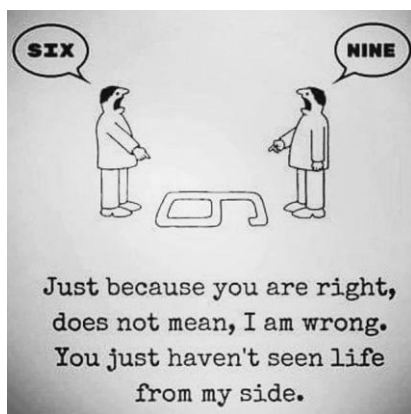
Christian Aid Afternoon Tea

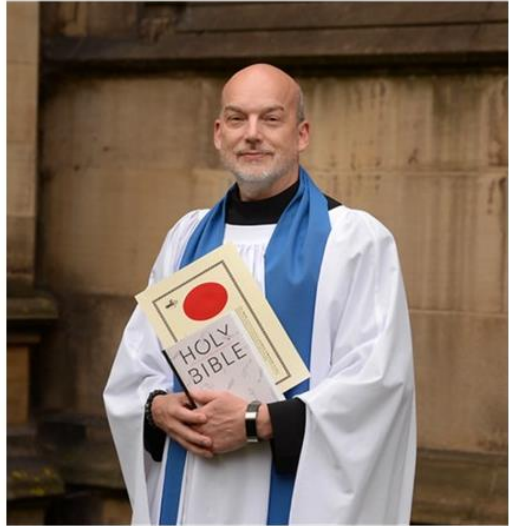
