AN EASTER MESSAGE FROM BISHOP DAVID

All four gospels conclude fairly quickly after Easter. It's a natural place to stop for books whose primary purpose is to tell the story of the earthly life and ministry of Jesus. And yet an unintended consequence of finishing where they do is to give the impression that Easter is somehow a conclusion - a joyful note on which to end the fast of Lent; a happy ending tacked on to the

tragedy of Holy Week.

Yet Easter is much less an ending than a beginning. It's the dawn of a world in which death has been defeated; the start of an era where love is proven stronger than the worst that evil can do; the issuing of an invitation, to people of all races and cultures, to live lives transformed by knowing that Jesus lives.



In the northern hemisphere, we celebrate Easter at the very time of year when new leaves and fresh blossom are covering so many trees, when flowers are once more abundant in parks and gardens, when countless newborn creatures are first opening their eyes to their surroundings.

The cycle of the year in itself should help spur us on to discover new ways to be a transforming Christian presence, both as individuals and churches, in our communities. This year particularly, we can congregate and meet in far less limited circumstances than in either of the two previous Easters.

So, let us make the most of this joyful season, not as an end to what is past, but as the beginning of what is yet to come.

I didn't go to a church school and the only time that I, or any of my friends, wished we did was on Ascension Day. Church school pupils got the day off - and we didn't! I think that's gone by the wayside now and we don't seem to celebrate it much here in the UK. In some countries it's still a public holiday though. Odd, isn't it, that we make such a fuss about the arrival of Jesus but barely a murmur about his departure?

"So, we got Jesus in there. How do we get him back out again?" It must have been a dilemma for God and his angelic extraction team as they figured out how to reunite Father and Son.

Elijah had an Uber chariot to get him away, though he lost his favourite cloak in the process and the driver swore he couldn't find it. Maybe Elijah had gone through the app with Jesus during the transfiguration?

Perhaps Shakespeare had the right idea in 'A Winter's Tale'. One of the characters says: "I am gone for ever" - followed by that famous stage direction of: 'Exit, pursued by a bear'. I suspect the Acts of the Apostles would have been read much more widely if Luke had included that in his text.

Maybe Jesus should ride off into the sunset, like at the end of a Saturday matinee. Though it would need to be on a donkey rather than on a horse called Champion or Silver.

Perhaps those of a similar age to me envisage Jesus being beamed up, like in Star Trek? After all, the T in James T Kirk stood for Tiberius, the Emperor of Rome at the time of the ministry and execution of Jesus. So, there's a certain pleasing symmetry to that idea.

And down the ages, artists have got creative in conveying the departure of Jesus. But many of those paintings use as much, if not more, canvas and paint on the disciples as they do on Jesus. Because the ascension is as much about them and us as it is about him.

Some think of him going up in a rather splendid holy lift. For others it's more of a Mary Poppins moment or invisible wires taking him up like Peter Pan at the theatre.

Do the apostles just get to see the soles of his feet? Do those feet still show signs of being pierced? Or in the forty days have they healed?

I particularly love some of the medieval pictures where the bottom half of Jesus seems to be dangling from the base of a cloud – but instead of leaving his cloak he leaves his footprints. He's gone - but the signs of his having been here are still imprinted in the earth.

Of course, Jesus had to leave. The apostles still didn't get it. If Jesus was the Messiah, they thought part of the job description was to liberate the people from oppression. If he'd stayed, they would have just followed him round, expectant that every action would bring down the Roman Empire - to bring in a new world order; to introduce that new Kingdom that he kept talking about.

And Jesus' response is that: "it's not for you to know the time when this will happen. But my going means that you will get power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you. Power to do all that I can do. So, it'll be for you, not me, to bring in the new Kingdom."

Because Jesus didn't come to be the centre of attention. He came to transform us through love. To heal us and redeem us. To make us look out and not in.

In the Ascension story in Acts 1, two men suddenly appear asking the apostles: "What are you doing staring up there?" It's rather like the line in To Kill a Mockingbird: "There are just some kind of people who're so busy worrying about the next world that they've never learned to live in this one".

Ascension is a strange time. We mention it in the creed most weeks. But, unlike Christmas and Easter, there's no bank holiday here. No cards or presents exchanged. But it's that vital part in the church year when we're told by God to get on with it. "I'll give you the tools and I'll give you the back-up. Now go and bring the Kingdom of God to this place."

Because that's what we were put here to do, that's what we've been empowered to do.

And that may mean feeding the hungry or clothing those who need it. It may mean fighting for justice and equality. Or it may just mean looking at each other rather than up to the sky. Getting to know and care for each other. As it says in Hosea: "What I want is love, not sacrifice."

Joan was born at Bury General Hospital. The eldest of three children, with a brother and sister who both passed away before her. They lived in the Prettywood area of Heywood and then Heap Bridge. Joan lived in that area until a move to Eldon Street, Chesham over 40 years ago when she began to attend St.Mark and then St.John with St.Mark Church. Her two sons continue to live in Heap Bridge & Heywood.

Joan trained as a dressmaker and a seamstress and for a number of years had stalls on the markets at Bury, Heywood, Rawtenstall and Harpurhey. Those skills lasted throughout her life as she continued to sew and make clothes for the family and others. She was an expert knitter and crocheter. Just before going into hospital three weeks before she died, she completed a blanket that was sent to Ukraine.

Despite being quite a private person Joan had a hidden ministry – of devout faithfulness to her Heavenly Father. If there was a church event, Joan would be there. If a job in church needed doing – Joan would consider it. She has washed the linen; cleaned the church; played the keyboard for services; had a stall at the Church Fairs and joined in the Communion services at Burrswood House amongst many other church commitments.

Joan was so thorough that when she knew she wouldn't be around for much longer, arrangements were made for other people to take over these tasks.

Joan's clear and simple faith meant that she knew that God loved her and she trusted in Him for all things. Even when informed of the diagnosis of terminal illness, her faith stood strong.

Joan died at North Manchester General Hospital on 24 March 2022. At her funeral service in St.John with St.Mark Church many members of her family and the church community gathered to celebrate her life.

The Vicar quoted the words of his predecessor Ian Stamp who had told him, "The church needs a lot more people like Joan".

We give thanks to God for Joan Birch and her life of Christian witness and service. May She Rest In Peace and Rise in Glory.

St. John with St. Mark PCC meeting of 29th March 2022

- Safeguarding All helpers for the Pantomime were DBS checked.
- Fit and Proper Person declarations. all received for current PCC.
- Pantomime was well received. This had been delayed from January due to Covid amongst the cast. Debbie appreciated all the help given. She will do a debrief with the team and start planning for next year.
- Ukraine There was a collection for Ukraine taken after each of the Panto performances and the total given was matched anonymously by a member of our congregation. Total given £1000.
- Our Hall the Vicar pointed out that on 12th March it had been 50 years since it was first dedicated for use.
- Faculty for removing pews at back of church is continuing its various stages on-line.
- Parish Share we have received a thank you from the Area Dean, the Deanery Treasurer and Budget Secretary for paying our 2021 Parish Share in full. For 2022 the Diocese have asked us for 2% more than last year but based this on 2019 attendance. The draft APCM report was received from June and Ian. This summarises our main activities last year and this year and links them to the accounts where applicable. It was accepted for inclusion at the APCM which will meet on Sunday 1st May.
- Utility Bills are already rising. The bill for the church gas alone was £530 for March. Please use heat and light sparingly and turn them both off if you are the last to leave church or hall.
- Planned Giving so far this year we are averaging £100 less a
 week than we were last year due to the passing of some of our
 givers or people going into care. If you're not already in the
 planned giving scheme, then please join and help to maintain our
 ministry and mission.
- Mission Community is up and running with Julian Heaton as its leader. A focal leader for our Parish will need appointing in due course. The Vicar reported that the Community had already proved useful in helping to fill a slot at one of our Eucharistic services.
- Magazine Bury Council had decided not to continue with its printing services so we have looked for a new printer. Thanks expressed to Christine, who has done it for us for so many years.

From the Vicarage

- * Thanks as always to those who decorated both churches so beautifully for our Easter Day celebrations. After the starkness of the Lenten season and especially the emptiness of Good Friday it is always a joy to step inside church to celebrate the Resurrection on Easter morning.
- * Thanks also to the Working Party who meet regularly at Christ Church on a Thursday morning and do any number of tasks in the churchyard. Particular appreciation for the work on the lychgate. Take a closer look if you haven't noticed the changes in recent weeks.
- * The conflict in Ukraine continues to dominate our thoughts and at the time of writing there seems to be no improvement in the situation there. The Church of England website regularly updates a series of prayers and details of other means of support. There is a toolkit to find ways to pray, give and act at http://cofe.io/UkraineCrisis. The Polish Centre in Bury continue to provide humanitarian and medical help on regular visits to Eastern Europe. They can be contacted at their headquarters on Back East Street, BL9 ORU and on 0161 764 5939.
- * It was announced last month that the Revd. Elizabeth Binns has been appointed Priest-in-Charge of All Saints' Stand. The date of her induction has yet to be arranged. Details will be announced on the weekly Bulletins / News Sheets. Elizabeth will continue to minister at our midweek Communion services in the Benefice.
- * Christ Church now has the facility for contactless payments. The card reading machine is situated at the back of church. If you wish to use this, please contact one of the church officers at Christ Church.
- * We are still awaiting the decision of Bury Council's Planning Department following the signing of the contract between Christ Church PCC and Morris Homes to build houses on the church field.

Comments have been requested from members of the public and the outcome will be announced as soon as a decision is made.

- * Churches Together in Bury represent most of the Christian Churches in the town. The group meets every two months, with a prayer group which meets fortnightly. They have now begun to meet in person again. Anyone is able to attend these meetings. Details are in the Bulletin / News Sheet in the relevant weeks.
- * The Men of the Benefice (MOB) meet on the last Monday of each month. We gather at the Towler Inn from 8pm.
- * The Parish Office is open every Wednesday evening between 6.30-7.00pm at St.John with St.Mark Church Hall. This can be for enquiries about baptisms or weddings or any other matter.
- * Porch Boxes are always in need of food and toiletries especially in this current situation. A box is available at the back of both churches. Thanks to those who support those in need.
- *The Ministry Team consisting of all the Clergy, Licensed Readers and our Authorised Lay Minister meet every month usually on the second Monday evening. If you have an issue that you would like us to discuss, please contact one of the team.
- * Regular attenders to church are encouraged to join our planned giving scheme. If you would like to do so or would like some further information, please speak to one of the Treasurers

Christ, Ukraine, and radical compassion

The solidarity shown to Ukrainians has been inspiring. The church must lead the way in taking that compassion further.

In war, horror is made manifest. It takes a physical shape: a bombed out hospital; a family running for their lives; a discarded teddy bear, its owner nowhere to be found. Yet horror is not the only reality. As darkness falls from the sky and haunts the streets, love and light pour in to meet it.

A row of prams left at a train station by Polish mothers. Anti-war protesters braving imprisonment on the streets of Moscow. Hundreds of thousands of people across Europe opening their homes to refugees. War reveals the worst of humanity, but also sometimes the best.

The barbaric, criminal invasion of Ukraine has resulted in one of the largest spontaneous outpourings of compassion since the 2004 Boxing Day Tsunami. Nearly £200 million has been raised for the Disasters Emergency Committee appeal to date. (As we go to press this figure has reached £300 million.) In churches, homes and businesses around the land, the same refrain can be heard: 'What can we do to help?'

THE POSTURE OF COMPASSION

There is a narrative that the modern world has been overtaken by individualism. We are, supposedly, increasingly self-obsessed. Perhaps there is truth in that. But it is not the whole truth.

'What the response to the conflict in Ukraine has revealed is that, when given the opportunity, the natural posture of people is compassion.' We have seen this before – throughout the pandemic, with the Syria conflict, the Rohingya crisis, and with natural disasters such as the Nepal earthquakes, or Hurricane Matthew in Haiti.

Running through the bedrock of our society is a vein of Christian values. To be a Christian – to be at our most deeply human – is to open our arms as wide as Christ did on the cross. Because as well as being selfless, Jesus' love was boundless.

INCLUDING AND EMBRACING

The church must fiercely counter any narrative that separates the world into 'us' and 'them'. Because it is in Christianity that we find the alternative: radical compassion and solidarity. Divine love doesn't just tear down walls, it builds bridges in places you wouldn't expect.

The core of Jesus' ministry was reaching out to the marginalised and oppressed. Jesus sought out those who had previously been excluded, and included them; those who had been rejected, and embraced them; those who had been left out, and let them in.

That is the call of the church – our call. So how do we live it out at a time such as this? The compassionate and generous response to the conflict in Ukraine is a start. But we can go further: reaching out to those who have been excluded, those who have been rejected, those who have been left out. This is what Tearfund exists for.

While the eyes of the world have been fixed on Ukraine, other horrors have been taking place. With attention elsewhere, there is a risk that the cries of millions of marginalised and oppressed people are going unheard.

THE FORGOTTEN CRISES

Across the Horn of Africa – a region comprising Ethiopia, Somalia, Kenya and Uganda – a hunger crisis of colossal proportions has been building for months. Three rainy seasons in a



row have failed, with below-average rainfall forecast for a fourth. This on top of the devastation caused by the locust swarms of 2019-2021,

as well as violence such as that in Ethiopia. More than 13 million people are waking up severely hungry every day. Alarmingly, cuts to the UK aid budget, combined with attention being turned to Ukraine, means that this crisis could miss out on life-saving funding.

Similar disasters are taking place in Afghanistan, Syria and Yemen. We must not forget them. We must practice the radical compassion of our Christian faith and call attention and respond to these forgotten crises.

It is easy to feel overwhelmed or powerless in the face of such vast suffering. Yet we are not facing it alone. When we join together as the church, partnering with God's work of redemption and restoration, there is enormous power. We see this all the time at Tearfund – it is why we partner with networks of local churches. As the church unites in order to reach out, lives around the world are transformed.

Poverty is not God's plan. You are. We are. Radical compassion is. We won't stop trying to live out that compassion in our work, and we invite you to join us.
