Remember, Remember

As I write this, the sun is streaming through the conservatory windows and there is still some colour in the garden; the last of the roses, the hydrangeas and dahlias having a final fling before winter. I am sure however, if I went outside, I would know by the temperature that Summer had come to an end, Autumn was in full flood and Winter not far away. The changing seasons are part of our life, each bringing its own unique character and joys.

November is a time of remembrance from All Saints Day when we remember those who have passed into God's eternal kingdom, to November 5th when we remember Gunpowder, Treason and Plot by lighting bonfires and burning effigies of Guy Fawkes and of course November 11th when we remember those who made the ultimate sacrifice, giving their lives in past and present conflicts.

As Jesus says in the gospel "Greater love has no one than this that they lay down their lives for their friends." And this is what so many people have done in conflicts of the past, of the present and no doubt will continue to do so in the future. It is right that we should remember and honour them.

I am well aware that my memory is not what it once was and I need reminders to ensure that important events are not forgotten. (The editor had to remind me (very tactfully) that I had promised some weeks ago to write this letter!)



Many people will wear a poppy in November to remind them of the sacrifice of people in wars. The poppy was chosen because of the large numbers of them in the fields of Northern France and Belgium where much horrific fighting took place in the First World War. Its use was also inspired by John McCrae's poem "In Flanders Field."



As Christians we often wear another symbol of remembrance. A cross on a chain, or one of the pocket crosses reminds us of the sacrifice which Jesus made for us. Crosses feature prominently in our churches. They are strong reminders of his suffering and death but also point the way to the joy of the resurrection.

It is good that we remember, but remembrance on its own becomes nostalgia. ***Remembering should be followed by action.*** It is no use me remembering I have a magazine article to write if I do not sit at my computer and write it. It is of little use wearing a poppy and just thinking how sad it is that so many have suffered as a result of war.

It is the responsibility of each of us to ensure that those who gave their lives in conflicts of the past and present have not done so in vain. It is our responsibility to learn from the lessons of the past, to strive always for peace and work unceasingly to prevent and overcome hatred that future generations may live in a fairer, safer more equitable world.

Similarly, it is not enough just to remember that Jesus died for us. His suffering must compel us to act in ways that further his kingdom. We have an obligation to continue his teaching, to spread the good news to others. It is for us to make sure that his sacrifice and the benefits from it are not forgotten. That sacrifice must influence our thoughts, our action and our lives as we live in today's world.

Let us not forget.

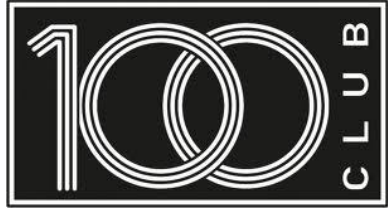

It was written by schoolboy Joshua Dyer, age 14 who when asked in 2019 to write a poem for Remembrance Day, without any help, wrote this in one hour.

When members asked, "What is the diocesan Transforming Prayer Community?" it seemed a good idea to invite an expert on the topic to talk to us! So we invited Kim Morgan-Jones, who is Head of Lay Development in Manchester. Kim hoped that the get-together could be a two-way process, asking members to feed into the community, including inviting anyone who was interested to write one of the short weekly reflections.

Whilst Area Dean, Rachel Mann came to talk to us about LLF (Living in Love and Faith) and offered to return to tell us more about herself. Since then, she has been appointed as Archdeacon of Salford and Bolton, making her diary even fuller than before. It was therefore an absolute delight to be able to welcome her once more. Rachel shared something of her story with us, beginning as a small boy, with three petitions in his prayers each night: that there would be no nuclear war, that his father would be made well, and that when he woke up next day he would be a girl. We heard a little about Rachel's transition, of her academic career as a teaching fellow at Lancaster University, and her coming back to faith. She was very honest about some of the difficulties she has encountered, the threats she has received, not least when appointed Archdeacon - the first trans senior cleric in the C of E. Rachel is well known as a broadcaster, an author (she brought some books for us to buy!), a poet - but that, she said, is a whole other talk, so we should invite her again. Don't miss it!

On 6th November, at our winter meeting time of 2pm, we will be led in a service of Holy Communion by Revd Robert Airey, a member from Emmanuel Holcombe.

Nigel and Barbara will host a Lancashire Afternoon at 2pm on 20th. There will be music, and we hope some dialect poems and tales from our county. If you can contribute please do.

Transforming Prayer Community

The Prayer Community was set up by Manchester Diocese with a view to helping Christians in this Diocese and beyond grow closer to God by supporting each other through prayer and fellowship.

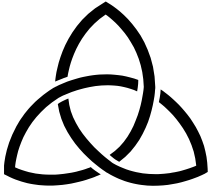
As of October 2024, it is estimated that around 1000 people have now signed up to this initiative and can do so in a variety of ways.

If you are on Facebook then the Community has its own page, which will keep you updated with regular events and themes to form part of your prayer life.

There is also an option for you to receive weekly e-mails. These are sent out each Monday around lunchtime and include a themed reflection, sometimes around a season of the year, a prayer based on that reflection and maybe an additional item on a particular Saint or theme for a month. As an example, the month of November will focus on Remembrance and then of course the many opportunities we have for prayer and reflection during Advent, Christmas and New Year. Monday morning is not always everyone's favourite time of the week so the timing of the reflection at lunchtime can sometimes be refreshing and set us in good Spirit for the week ahead. The reflections are not too long, so please do not be put off by a potentially long e-mail!

Of course, you do not have to sign up to the Prayer Community to join us in prayer. There are many opportunities to pray during the week and many of us have our preferred time of day to do this. Whatever works best for us. Either early morning, lunchtime, evening or late at night. By saying our own prayers, we know that others across the world are also praying at the same time and we can join together in this way. The Transforming Prayer Community has three recommended prayers we can use and one is simply the Lords' Prayer.

It would be good to have more people signed up for this and you can find out more by accessing this link tinyurl.com/3rxcbrrn or just head straight to the Manchester Diocese website. There are also some leaflets usually available at the back of our Churches with more information and which also contain the three suggested prayers to use.



OPEN GROUP

Ian Banks led our Open Group meeting on Wednesday 9th October and was an evening entitled 'Liturgy Matters'. This was a talk which gave us an idea of how a morning and evening worship service is structured, along with the must have's and have nots and was a streamlined version of an ALM training presentation which Ian leads for the Diocese.

After asking for our thoughts on what Liturgy means for us, we began of course with a history lesson, looking at the early introduction of the Book of Common Prayer from the time of Henry VIII, the Reformation and then moved on to the era around Oliver Cromwell's time.

Obviously now we are more familiar with the book of Common Worship and the three-year cycle that contains, but there will be people who remember or were brought up with the Alternative Service Book (1980) and probably still have a copy. This was an interim publication until Common Worship.

The evening was mainly devoted to the putting together of a worship service without Eucharist. Many of us are used to the more traditional Communion service we have and the structure we follow, but those who attend our non-Eucharistic morning worship and Sunday at Seven still identify themselves with a structure it entails. An introduction and gathering; The word of God, which usually includes the Gospel in our Benefice; A talk or sermon and a time of prayer. Hymns are of course chosen to reflect the theme.

We came to discuss what we like about our own service; Do we prefer to sit and listen to a preacher or to have an opportunity to be more interactive around tables like Café Church? What is the preferred length of a sermon? Would we be open to praying one to one with others and say prayers for healing or prefer a traditional Intercession? All these are not proposals to change our service Liturgy, but it did generate a small discussion at the end of the meeting. Thanks to Ian for leading us in this evening.

Our next Open Group will be on Wednesday 13th November and Ruth Spencer (Alan and Margery's daughter) will lead a talk entitled 'Almost Bake Off', following her application to appear on the Great British Bake Off. All are welcome at 7.30pm in the Barritt Room.

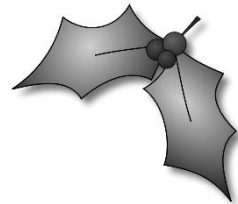
We were expecting to meet again on Monday 28th October and the November meeting is set for Monday 25th November (8.00pm) at a venue to be confirmed.

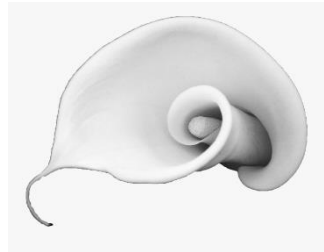
