The Church of England's theme this year for Advent and Christmas is

Follow the Star: Calm and Bright

drawing on that famous carol, Silent Night:
*"Silent Night! Holy Night!
All is calm, all is bright..."*

One of the reasons that this carol is so universally loved is the way it invites us into the still centre of the Christmas story, to contemplate Mary holding the new-born Jesus, the Light of the World.

Throughout Advent, the focus will be on how to find **Calm** during this busy period, with reflections offering a chance to pause during the busy season and tips on how to prepare for a calm Christmas.

Then through Christmas, the focus changes to **Bright**, with a series of daily reflections from Christmas Day to the Eve of Epiphany (5 January) which are available online or as a booklet, available at both churches.

There will also be reflective content throughout Advent and Christmas for those who find this time of year difficult.

Sign up for Reflections via email for daily messages.

Or follow them from 1 December using the Everyday Faith app.

We hope you will be able to join us during this season but if that is not possible worship with the online services.

Emmanuel – God with us. You’d better believe it!

We write this as we approach the Christmas season, a time to reflect on God’s love as He left Heaven to walk among us. For many, the word



Emmanuel is just something seen on Christmas cards each year, but we can testify that He does walk with us today, helping us to face the challenges of everyday life, both big and small.

As most of you will know, in September our life was turned upside down with a diagnosis that we had not seen coming, and yet we have never felt His presence more clearly. This has been experienced through the strangers who have come into our story as well as our friends, bringing the right words or actions at exactly the moment we needed them, not only for us but for our children as well. In Jersey He placed two women in my (Sally) path which resulted in managing to get a walking stick when Harvie was unable to walk; In the early days, when Harvie was wakeful and confused, He heard God’s still, small voice when listening to the Lectio 365 App (highly recommended), listening to the promises of God in Scripture, that He will never leave us nor forsake us; Harvie received a wonderful drawing that somebody had drawn for him, depicting something so personal that could not possibly be known by the artist, but perfectly expressed something that has been on Harvie’s heart for a long time and spoke to him very directly. This is now framed and hung on the wall to encourage us every time we enter our home. This is God in action – not theoretically, but actually, here and now in Bury!

And now, as Walmersley Road prepares to enter the New Year, we would encourage you to remember that God is with you wherever you travel and whatever you do. Sometimes we have to make sure we keep our eyes open, ready to see God at work. We need to lift our eyes from



ourselves and look for what He is doing, holding on to his coat tails and allowing him to gently lead us. And, we need to keep faith when the waves threaten to overpower us. We need to learn to rest with Jesus at the back of the boat, instead of struggling with the oars, knowing that He is mightier than any storm and will not forsake us.

So, may the peace of the Christ Child be with you and those you love, now and as we move forward into 2025,

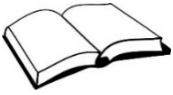


Flowers in church

- * Please see page 3 for details of the CoFE Follow the Star theme for this Christmas. David Robinson has 20 reflection booklets, so please get in touch if you would like one. It will likely be first to ask and first to receive.

- * Mince pies are usually served after the Carol services at both Churches but we require donations. If you can help (either home-made or shop bought) please bring before the event on 15th December.

- * Owing to the logistics of storage this year, the Salvation Army Christmas Present Appeal which we usually support was a little late going live this year. Thankfully Seedfield Methodist Church has been able to help and so all contributions would be gratefully received in both churches but ideally by 2 December. If you have a lot please ask for a contact number to deliver directly to Seedfield. Please see page 9 for more details.

- * If you are able, do please join the group which takes a short act of worship into the Priory Highbank Centre around four times a year. We shall sing carols and tell the Christmas story on Monday, 16 December at 2.30pm and you would be most welcome.

- * Thanks to St Peter's for organising a quiz evening for our Mission Community; to St John with St Mark's for hosting it; to those who provided a great pie and peas supper and to all who came. The UB was represented, but only managed 3rd place - despite being joint 1st at half time! We did not know our food and drink round!

Summary of the St. John with St. Mark PCC meeting of 24th September 2024

- There was an update on Harvie following his surgery
- Service cover has been found for most services up to the end of January including Christmas services. However, the 8.30am 3rd Sunday is now cancelled and the 3rd Thursday of the month will become Compline.
- A Safeguarding update was provided.
- Pantomime: There will not be a production in 2025.
- Cenotaph at the Salvation Army Citadel: The Vicar had passed on a quote from Rawsons for repainting the lettering. It was agreed we need more quotes and to explore if grants are available.
- Chairs for the hall: 120 chairs have been delivered with separate securing clips totalling £3074.00.
- Correspondence: The Diocese have informed us it is now the responsibility of the Church to organise their Quinquennial rather than the Diocese. Adrian Pearson will do the inspection and visit us on Wednesday 20th November. This will include both the Church and the hall.
- Finance: We are up to date with Parish Share; Our next planned giving envelopes are here starting from November 2024 and the income survey runs through October; Makerfield came out to check the sound system and roving microphones; The annual licence fee to Bury MBC has been paid; The carpet in the Barritt Room has been replaced at exactly the same spec as the original and this was covered by an anonymous donation; The Church gas contract is due for renewal and a new supplier has been found. The proceeds for this year's 100 Club were handed over.
- Hall door to Church corridor: It was felt to be a good idea to replace this double door with ones that could be secured but easily opened in case of emergency. We have contacted the company who supplied the other fire doors. Howarth Timber are the nearest supplier. Ian to approach and get a quote.
- Health & Safety: All checks are up to date.
- The next PCC meeting is on Tuesday 19th November.

Notes from the Christ Church meeting held on 13 November

1. The 24th September minutes were accepted: proposed P Stokes, seconded L Lees, all in favour.
2. The treasurer reported on the current finances. It was noted that we had received income from the harvest lunch of £180. The ash tree with dieback has been felled at a cost of £980. The organisations' contributions to the use of the hall in 2025 were discussed.
3. A meeting held with John Book the diocesan heating advisor regarding the failed church boiler and its replacement was discussed and it was decided that the secretary would look further into the diocesan recommendations; and that a decision would be made as soon as possible regarding a replacement boiler.
4. A smart meter has been fitted to the gas meter which feeds both the church and church hall. The Quinquennial Inspection of the church was carried out on the 13th November 2024.
5. A discussion was held regarding the future of the church and the church hall regarding improving the church and the church hall. It was noted that the Church of England has produced excellent information for the PCC to guide them through such a process and the actions necessary for any work in modifying the buildings.
6. Safeguarding was discussed and all PCC members were asked to log into the online course on safeguarding and complete it. Already a number had done so. The safeguarding officer had just received the DBS certificate and registered for updates.
7. The following items were discussed /decided in any other business.
 - A PCC member will liaise with CH Users regarding the purchase of a new water boiler for the church hall kitchen.
 - A new portable keyboard was discussed but no final decision was made.
 - It was agreed to purchase two new notice boards for either side of the Lych gate to replace the old boards which are out of date and decaying. The colour, design and content was agreed.
 - A report was presented to the PCC on work which needs to be completed on the Church Hall.

Summary of the St. John with St. Mark PCC meeting of 19th November 2024

- Harvie is currently undergoing treatment five days a week. We continue to hold Harvie and Sally in our prayers.
- Services: The guest Choir who joined us for the Carol Service last year cannot be with us this time; It has been agreed to cancel the Thursday evening Communion on 2nd January.
- There was an update on DBS's. It was noted that safeguarding is likely to be a strong topic now due to recent events in the Church of England, and the letter from Bishop David on this subject was commented on.
- Mission Community Activities: We were briefed on the meeting at the end of October and some of the subjects; There was a question about care homes in the Parish; Reverend Sam Eccleston has been appointed at Kirklees Valley Churches and his licensing is on 4th December.
- Cenotaph at the Salvation Army Citadel: Following the service on Remembrance Sunday it has been noted that the names and lettering cannot now be read. The job needs to be done professionally and may now have to wait until Summer.
- Quinquennial: This is happening on 20th November. We have made progress on some jobs from last time.
- Hall Access: It has been suggested that a turnkey option should be installed on the front door to allow easy exit from the inside but ensuring that unauthorised access from the outside cannot happen. Quotes will be sought and new keys will be needed.
- Finance: We have had to replace the Zip boiler and microwave in the kitchen; PAT testing has taken place and the linking fire door from hall to corridor has been replaced; Water rates and waste disposal bill have been paid.
- There is a Zoom meeting for wardens at the end of November.
- Our health and safety officer Keith has sadly died this month. He has served us exceptionally well down the years. There were no other matters to discuss on health and safety.
- The next PCC meeting is on Thursday 23rd January 2025.

MEET THE CAST

This year members of Mothers' Union and quite a number of friends have been knitting angels – and some of you probably wondered why. Across our Christmas services, beginning with Springside School's Carol Service on 13 December, any children who come to church will receive a small angel (perhaps to hang on the Christmas tree) together with a book called "Meet the Cast".

On Sunday, 22 December, at 3pm, in the Hall at Christ Church we are holding a short, lively, family friendly service for anyone, of any age, who would like to join us.

Winter Night Shelter

As the winter nights are now upon us, Bolton Road Methodist Church are now offering their premises for rough sleepers. This will only be available on nights when the severe weather protocol is triggered (ie – below zero). The people using the facilities are recommended by the council. Volunteers are needed for each night it is in use to help with serving supper from 8-10pm and breakfast and clearing up from 7.45-8.30am. This will usually be Monday to Friday. Two people are also required to sleep over.

If you feel you could help with this or know someone who may then please contact Kathy Selby at Bolton Road Methodist Church or maybe one of our Churches Together Representatives in this Benefice who can pass your details on. A full DBS will be required for this work but can be arranged if you do not already hold one.



OPEN GROUP

For our meeting on Wednesday 13th November, we were delighted to be joined by Ruth Spencer (Margery and Alan's daughter), who presented a talk for us based on her experience of applying for the Great British Bake Off.

The talk was appropriately titled 'Almost Bake Off'.

Ruth began by introducing herself and advising that this experience had come about due to finding a hobby during the Covid lockdown. Ruth was on the reserve list but still had to complete the full end-to-end process including Zoom interviews, DBS checks, social media history background checks and the filming.

We received stories from each of the nine themed weeks and the challenges that each one brought. What particularly captured my attention was the ideas around the creations. So many were based around personal experiences and background of physics teacher to form the basis around Ruth's ideas. Margery and Alan had provided much of the inspiration! This was an enlightening and informative talk from Ruth and gave us an insight into what goes on inside the famous tent. We were also treated to some home bakes as Ruth brought us some salted oatmeal white chocolate cookies and gluten free spicy chocolate chip cookies. I have the recipes if you would like me to forward them on.

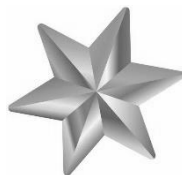

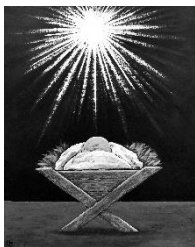

Every two months in Manchester Diocese there is a MU newsletter circulated to members. There are copies available and if anyone would like to have one please ask Barbara Taylor, branch secretary. November's is seven pages so everything cannot possibly be shared here.

Twice a year Diocesan Council is held and this is a great opportunity to hear what is happening across the diocese, to share fellowship with other members, to buy cards, etc and to hear speakers from some of the charities working with families across Manchester. Often there are ways in which we are able to help by providing resources for these families and it is encouraging to hear these stories. As the October meeting would be Christine's final Council as Diocesan President she was given flowers and gifts and thanked for her hard work and commitment. We also congratulated her on her election as the next Provincial President of York, aka the Northern Province.



A Service of Thanksgiving and Celebration at the end of this triennium was held in Manchester Cathedral. It was attended by the Lord-Lieutenant, High Sheriff, Lord Mayor, several borough Mayors and many special guests. 31 candles were lit to give thanks for and to celebrate the organisations, projects and areas of support MU is involved in locally, nationally and worldwide.

The Dean, The Very Reverend Rogers Govender, gave a memorable address highlighting the important and far reaching work of MU. He encouraged us to be proactive in our work and witness, not simply reacting to identified needs presented to us.

Several of our members were present just three days later at Blackburn Cathedral when York Province celebrated the work of MU over the last 6 years and gave thanks for the leadership of June Houghton as our provincial president, and her bevy of diocesan presidents. Rosemary Taylor carried Manchester's banner and one of the readings was by Catherine Hilton, who has served as a member of the worldwide board of trustees for 6 years, elected by members of the province. It was so good to catch up with friends from the past who had travelled from all across the North.



Philip North, Bishop of Blackburn, an enthusiastic MU member, presided and preached. The gospel was the well-known story of Martha, Mary and Lazarus (*Luke 10: 38-42*). Bishop Philip, from his own experience of family life, claimed that Martha must be "the middle child" and expected to "do everything that needs to be done"! He then reminded us that this story in Luke's Gospel comes between that of the Good Samaritan (a great example of faith in action) and the disciples asking Jesus to teach them how to pray. He suggested we should look at the story of Martha and Mary as an example of the balance we need to find in our own lives and in our membership of Mothers' Union.

There were very few at our first afternoon meeting after the clocks went back but we appreciated Revd. Robert Airey, from Emmanuel Holcombe, coming to preside at Holy Communion. This was followed by tea, coffee and parkin and a lively discussion, primarily about various aspects of 'remembrance'.

On December 4 at 2pm in the Hall, "Wishing, Waiting, Pondering" will be led by Catherine Hilton. Advent services are being held at 2pm on December 1 at Emmanuel Church Centre for our Deanery, and at 11am on December 9 at St Ann Manchester for the Diocese. All are welcome.

We shall not meet on New Year's Day, so our first meeting of 2025 will be at 2pm on 15 January.

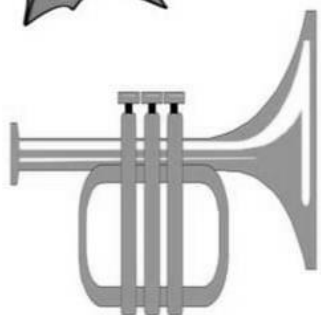

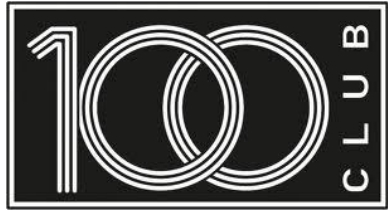
