


So, let's talk about the Bury Mission Community—BMC for short (because, honestly, who has time to say the whole thing every time?). We're the Anglican churches around Bury: Walmersley Road, Bircle, Roch Valley, St Paul's, BPC, Elton, and Kirklees Valley.

When this whole "Mission Communities" idea first popped up, the big plan was for churches to work together, freeing people up to try new things in ministry. Now, not to be *too* cynical, but my initial reaction was something along the lines of: *Wait... who exactly was chained up in their parishes? Weren't we already trying to be missional? And is another layer of church admin really the answer?* My eyebrows went up back then, and, well, they're still up.

That said - things *are* happening. This year, we've got a solid three-part plan:

- 1. **We're worshipping together.** Yes, obviously, but we're aiming for something a bit outside our comfort zones. Stay tuned.
- 2. **We're getting stuck into community service.** We're joining the Bury litter-picking group. Why? Because looking after the environment is important, we'll meet our neighbours, and we want to prove that Christians are, in fact, pretty normal (mostly).
- 3. **We're having a social event.** Specifically, a Quiz Evening where we can invite friends and neighbours. Competitive types, consider this your official warning.

Is this the grand, earth-shattering Mission Plan? Maybe. But it's also about connection - recognising that we're all in this together as sisters and brothers in Christ. Worshipping, serving, and just spending time together is what church life should be about.

But wait, there's more! (Yes, I sound like an infomercial.)

- We're holding a **BMC confirmation service** in September
- Join us at the Easter Vigil at BPC (6:30pm on Easter Eve, mark your calendars).
- We're diving into Carbon Literacy because, let's be honest, we just lived through the hottest January on record, and creation care is non-negotiable.

Plenty to do, then. But here's the thing - following Christ was never meant to be a solo mission. These things are easier (and more fun) together. So, consider this your official invite. Come along, get involved, and let's see where this year takes us!

Then you may be interested in joining the Electoral Roll!

This means: You can vote on church matters;

attend the Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM); raise any questions of parochial or general church interest; stand for election to the Parochial Church Council (PCC); represent your church within the wider church family.

Every six years new Rolls must be prepared and 2025 is the year. The timings are different in our two churches as the exercise must be completed between 15 and 28 days before the APCMs, which are to be 6 April at St John with St Mark and 18 May at Christ Church.

Please listen for announcements in church, read the notice sheets and fill out the forms when they are available. If you have any questions please speak to one of the Wardens.

Summary of the St. John with St. Mark PCC meeting of 23rd January 2025.

- Services have been covered up to the end of April and this
 includes the Ash Wednesday and Holy Week services. Harvie's
 aim is to return to lead worship on Easter Day (20th April) and
 this will be a joint Benefice service. It was also mentioned that
 some baptisms and weddings are booked in.
- There was a review of Mission Community events and any particular focus on care homes in our Parish.
- We are awaiting the report back from the Quinquennial inspection.
- Acknowledgment letters have been received back from some of the charities we supported for 2024; the amounts raised for Christies at Christmas and Children's Society at the Christingle were confirmed.
- Ian went through the draft accounts for 2024 and all was discussed and confirmed. These will now be sent for independent examination. The APCM will be held on Sunday 6th April and there was the usual appeal for groups to submit reports.
- The electoral roll will be completely revised this year. The
 announcements will take place after the Sunday services on
 26th January and 2nd February and the revision will take place
 between Sunday 9th February and Sunday 9th March. A notice
 to this effect is also on the Church door.
- A turnkey lock will be fitted to the Church Hall door to enhance security. (This has happened the week after the meeting).
- The roll of health and safety officer was discussed and a further conversation will take place at a suitable time.
- Dates of coffee mornings and Fairs for this year were discussed and confirmed. There will be a coffee morning on Saturday 29th March.
- The next PCC meeting is on Tuesday 18th March at 7.30pm.

- * The Church of England's Lent theme for 2025 is Living Hope. A series of readings and reflections have been written, which explore how we can have hope in times of frustration or uncertainty; the hope found in joining with others; the invitation to notice signs of hope around us; the courage to face reality and pursue a hopeful future; and the ways God transforms death into life at Easter. Ask at church about resources or visit cofe.io/LivingHope We have a very small number of the CofE 40-day reflection booklets. Please ask David Robinson if you would like a copy, but it will likely be first to ask and first to receive.

 The upcoming dates are 6th March and 3rd April.
- * As we go to press there is still opportunity to register for the Bury and Rossendale Lay Leadership Conference on 1st March, 9.30am-1pm at St John with St Mark. This is open to all who volunteer in our churches and is "an opportunity to learn, to be encouraged, to be empowered". Registration is through Eventbrite.
- * Churches Together in Bury have asked for help from all churches to continue to make the Good Friday Walk of Witness a successful outreach to the people of Bury (see page 25)
- * At Christ Church, work to replace the heating boiler has commenced, and the plan is to return to worship in church on 16 March, which will be a day of great thankfulness, rejoicing and welcome! The Archdeacon of Salford and Bolton should be here for the 10.30am service which will also include baptisms. Everyone is welcome to join us for a bring and share lunch in the Hall after the services. (see page 28)
- * There is a very real need for the work of Porch Boxes at this time. Please do all you can to contribute. A box is available at the back of both churches and there are lists of the items most needed.

At 9am on Saturday 8th February around 70 people from across the Deanery gathered at Bury Church High School for the first ever Growing Younger Conference. It opened with worship – a different kind of worship for many of us – Wiggle Worship. The biblical text was Joshua 1: 9, 'Have I not commanded you? Be strong and courageous. Do not be frightened, and do not be dismayed, for the LORD your God is with you wherever you go.'



We were involved both spiritually and physically! Many schools and play groups have adopted it, involving young families in worship. It has a clear worship structure that is easy to follow, and can be tailored to suit your context. It is a tool to engage families and is a tool for transition from nursery to school. Little things can become intentional Christian practice

which shapes faith for the long term, planting seeds that can bear fruit for the rest of their lives. It nurtures parents, carers and communities.

This was followed by a keynote speech by Jo Haslam, the Diocesan Early Years Adviser who is also a Youth and Children and Family ALM. She introduced her talk with the statistic that 40% of practising Christians came to faith before the age of five. The greatest impact we can have is with the very young but in many churches the focus is on adults.

Following this there were a number of different workshops –

Intergenerational

Planting seeds, growing faith

Youth Sacred Spaces

Christianity, Mindfulness, and Well-being

Intergenerational – Everyone in church together rather than separate children's groups. 'There were no children's groups at the crossing of the Red Sea!'

In the Intergenerational group we learned of examples of different ways to involve families in worship.

One example was Campfire Church which is self-explanatory – outdoors with a campfire and activities based around a theme. This happens once a month at 3pm at Emmanuel Church Centre in Holcombe Brook.

Another was St Anne's Edgeside who run a Messy Church every first Sunday morning with families pre-booking for breakfast followed by: Notices and birthdays; 'Theme for the Day' in 'Our God is a great big God'; children's choir; bible story (God stories available on YouTube); craft.

There is an opportunity for bible study for those who don't wish to take part.

A Pop up Nativity saw over 100 attending.

Christianity, Mindfulness, and Well-being

This was led by Karen Openshaw and Julie McAuley who run a drop in monthly at a church plant in Radcliffe. Karen has written a number of books on Mindfulness and faith together with Bishop Chris Edmondson.

To sum up, Mindfulness is 'being in the present moment, mindful of being in the presence of God.' Taking care of yourself.


At 1pm, the conference was closed by the Bishop of Middleton, Mark Davies.

Anthology of Public Prayers, Mothers' Union

The World Day of Prayer, falls on the first Friday of March each year



Its symbol is made up of arrows converging from the four points of the compass, persons kneeling in prayer, and a circle, representing the world and our unity through all our diversity.

In 2025 the people of the Cook Islands have written this service, and say,

At the closing of a gathering, our Tongareva elders always say these powerful words of encouragement:

'Kia mau te serenga! Kia mau te napena! Kia mau!'

This means 'hold on tight to who you are, in all aspects of your existence!' We are wonderfully made by God, and we should cherish all the aspects of who we are!"

March 17th is the day we think of **St Patrick**, patron saint of Ireland.

The following was written in 1949 by Annie Blake, living on a farm in rural Ireland.

Is there aught that I can wish you, that has not been wished before?

Shall I wish that health and gladness be increasing more and more?

Or perhaps that you will be happy and all sadness stand apart?

No, I'll simply wish "God bless you" and I wish it from my heart.

Praying in every season Mothers' Union



2025 For 80 years, Christian Aid has been fighting poverty and injustice. With your support, we've

been able to offer hope to communities who need it most. Our groundbreaking work began in 1945, when we were founded by British and Irish churches to help refugees following the Second World War.

1940s We helped refugees in need at the end of the Second World War. We raised more than £80,000 (£3 million plus in today's money) for emergency supplies in mainland Europe. We supported, equipped and enabled partner churches there to meet the needs of their people.

1950s We launched Christian Aid Week to raise extra funds. We continued helping refugees in mainland Europe as well as those from Palestine, Korea and China. We supported the establishment of the Voluntary Service Overseas (VSO) to enable young people to make a difference, and offered help to churches in countries moving from colonialism to independence to meet the needs of poor people.

1960s We made a difference in crises affecting Nigeria/Biafra, Kenya and India. We created the Disasters Emergency Committee (DEC) so that development agencies were seen to work together in times of humanitarian crisis. We helped set the World Development Movement to encourage political campaigning. We addressed racism and poverty in the United States as well as advising Martin Luther King while he was in the UK.

1970s We drew a link between educating supporters at home about the root causes of poverty and work with partners overseas to eradicate it. We popularised world development issues by providing seed money to establish the New Internationalist magazine. We explained the connection between our consumer culture at home and the global food crisis by launching a campaign to live simply.

1980s We fed hungry people during the Ethiopian famine and those experiencing drought in Mozambique. We led a mass lobby of parliament to call for more official development aid. We created the Southern African Coalition to demand an end to apartheid.

1990s We linked work in 50 poor countries to campaigns on developing world debt, fair trade and the policies of the International Monetary Fund and the World Bank. We challenged the stigma and discrimination experienced by people living with HIV in sub-Saharan Africa. We stood up for and provided food for refugees in Kosovo.

2000s We campaigned to make poverty history during a war against terror. We reached more than 500,000 people with food, shelter and healthcare after the Asian Tsunami. We publicised the fact that developing countries lose more money through the tax evasion practices of large corporations than they receive through official aid.

2010s We inform about and campaign against climate change. We champion tax justice. We continue to work with local partners on the ground to make a practical difference to the lives of new waves of refugees locally while campaigning and advocating for change globally.

One refugee's experience: In the camps, it was Christian Aid that sent the parcels...feeding us for two-and-a-half years, and I never forgot it. Christian Aid helped me to survive and I feel I owe my life to Christian Aid. I vowed there and then to do my best as long as I live, and I'm still doing it - Theodor Davidovic, Refugee and long-term Christian Aid supporter.

And over these 80 years, we've harnessed something formidable. Something that can't be silenced by injustice. Something that refuses to sit back and watch poverty ravage communities. We call it the unstoppable power of hope. Together we can make hope unstoppable.

Right now, we need the power of hope more than ever. As tragic events continue to unfold across the world, we can't stop here. Donate and help us in making lasting change possible

This year, Christian Aid Week will focus on the poverty in the communities of Burundi. Over 70% of people in Burundi face hunger and poverty every single day. Finding work and food is a constant battle, and even those with a roof over their heads often lack necessities like electricity and clean water.


Whilst extremely grateful for the donations received, we do also pray that a lasting peace in Ukraine can be found.
