After a long dark Winter, Spring brings us signs of new life and hope. Looking out at our gardens, we see snowdrops, daffodils and crocuses - rays of colour in what have been months of drab uncertainty. The tectonic plates of global and local life have shifted and we try again to make sense of the landscape we find ourselves in. If, like me, you feel cut adrift from your usual routine, be comforted because Spring also brings with it the certainty that Christ is risen from the dead and still reaches out to us, His creation.

The church landscape has also changed, as the Archbishop of Canterbury stood down and what many saw as opportunities to put things right were not taken. Many are now questioning the role the church has in the modern world and if it can ever become a force for good again. I, for one, will always believe that whilst Christ sits on the throne, His bride the church will be a force for good in a world of ever-changing opinions and understandings.

It is into this world view that I try to speak from a place of weakness.

As a vicar who has been unable to get involved with the care of others during a long period of illness, I find myself frustrated and have sought out my own anchor points from my long Christian journey. In times when I don't feel the presence of God so clearly, I need to remember the fact that it was *He* who called *me* to serve Him, and I have been certain of his calling, and his love for me ever since. I concentrate on what I know to be true and the evidence for that throughout my life in Him. Easter reminds us that God's not dead, even when we feel cast adrift and abandoned.


We need to make a concerted effort to remind ourselves that 'the earth is the Lord's and everything in it'; it is the work of His hands and He holds the past, present and future together.

During my cancer treatment, there have been times when I have questioned whether the treatment is working. I have allowed medicines to be put into my body, not knowing if anything was changing. The medical team assured me that things were progressing but for me, all I felt was fatigue. So it has been with my walk with God. I pray and bring glory to His name but, on occasions, I'm left with the feeling He has gone on holiday. It is at these times I need to return to my anchor points and remember that Christ will never leave nor forsake us. A timely reminder when the world is changing all around us. We, the church, need to regain our confidence in the things we once took for granted but now have to work harder to believe. The message of Easter is a great place to start. Christ has died, Christ is risen, Christ will come again.

Can you put your faith in the Creator of the universe, or will you be swayed by the winds of change blowing through our world at this time?

We need to remember what has held us together for over 2000 years and go into the future trusting in the God who loves us so much that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him shall have eternal life.

Every six years new Rolls must be prepared and 2025 is the year. At Christ Church there is still time to add your name. Collect a form from church or download from the website.

The <u>Annual Parochial Church Meeting</u> for St John with St Mark will be held on Sunday 6th April at 12.15pm.

- * Pray for Growth: a monthly gathering in St John's House 10am-11am to pray for growth in our Deanery of Bury and Rossendale. More information from Ima at imalomax@manchester.anglican.org The next date is 3rd April.
- * We hold in our prayers Archdeacon Rachel as she undergoes surgery at the beginning of April. The acting archdeacon during her absence is Revd Simon Cook, Area Dean of Bolton.
- * Our Lent group is looking at the Church of England's theme for 2025, Living Hope. You can still join us for the final two sessions on Tuesdays 1st and 8th April at 7.30pm in the Barritt Room.
- * There will be Easter cards produced with details of Holy Week and Easter services for the people of our Parishes. Help will be needed to distribute these, so please get in touch with one of the wardens for information on how to be involved.
- * Regular attenders to church are encouraged to join our planned giving scheme. If you would like to do so or would like some further information, please speak to one of the treasurers.
- * As we move into a new fiscal year this may be a good time to consider increasing your giving, especially for those with standing orders as it is so easy to forget when it simply leaves your bank each month with other expenses. Speak to our planned giving officers or treasurers if you need more information.
- * There is a very real need for the work of Porch Boxes at this time. Please do all you can to contribute. A box is available at the back of both churches and there are lists of the items most needed.

Report from the meeting of Christ Church PCC on 17th February 2025.

The lay chair welcomed our Area Dean, the Revd. Canon Donna Williams, to the meeting and invited her to open it with prayer.

The diocese has offered a free energy audit and the consultant from Arrow Energy is coming on 4th March to carry out a survey on church.

It was noted that there was still time to book for the lay Leadership conference.

The PCC secretary's resignation (from the date of the APCM) had been received.

The Treasurer reminded everyone that there is now a need to register the church as a charity, rather than the Excepted Charity it currently is.

The Church Hall has received several bookings for birthday parties and there are baptisms and weddings booked for church.

All aspects of safeguarding were discussed at length and it was noted that all officers need to have completed the foundation course on the diocese safeguarding web site.

The churchyard group reported that two ash trees with ash dieback had been removed and work had been carried out on the church hall.

It was noted that a confirmation service for our Mission Community will take place at Christ Church, on September 21st.

There was a discussion of the points from the General Synod meeting on safeguarding.

Outreach was discussed.

The Reverend Canon Donna Williams joined us for a general discussion on the future and a useful outcome was achieved.

It was felt that further discussion on the future of the church buildings is best left in abeyance whilst the Vicar is unable to be part of this.

Summary of St John with St Mark PCC meeting of 19th March 2025

- Services have been covered on the rota up to the end of July. It is hoped that Harvie can return to regular services after Easter and the rota can be adapted accordingly. It was mentioned that Easter cards will be available again with services and times.
- It has been proposed that any PCC members who wish to stand for election at the APCM in April must have their DBS and safeguarding processed straightaway without any exception.
- There was a review of Mission Community activities with dates of events. There are Lent Evensongs taking place at Bury Parish Church on Sundays in Lent with preachers from across the MC.
- The electoral roll forms are now all back and in the process of being dealt with by the electoral roll officer, in readiness for the APCM report.
- We have received an acknowledgment from the Diocese regarding the Parish information survey we recently completed. The eco survey is still waiting to be done.
- The NHS group, who use the hall twice a week, will be renewing their contract for a further 12 months.
- The PCC report for the APCM booklet was approved, but there was a reminder that some groups have not yet submitted reports.
- Rosemarie wanted to acknowledge a vote of thanks to all members of the PCC for their continued support and to all those people in the congregation who carry out little jobs that keep the Church running well.
- Health and safety checks are continuing to be done and any accidents dealt with through the correct channels.
- A VE Day 80th celebration is being held at Christ Church on Tuesday 6th May and we are encouraged to join the celebrations. Appeals will be put on the weekly sheet for stories and offers of memorabilia. There are to be coffee mornings on Saturday 26th April and Saturday 12th July. The Summer Fair is on Saturday 7th June. Ian received some information regarding a group called Eden Singers who travel and lead concerts. He will contact them to see if they can visit us with a view to hosting an event for a charity.
- The next PCC meeting will be after the APCM on Sunday 6th April. PCC members were advised who is up for re-election.

THE 80th anniversary of VE Day, the formal end of the Second World War in Europe, is to be marked in May, including



a service at Westminster Abbey (on 8th). The Dean said, "It is a moment to give thanks, to honour a generation that showed extraordinary courage and resilience and to recommit ourselves to the courage and resilience necessary to sustain peace." *(Church Times)*

Other events will include a military procession, a flypast of military aircraft, and the Cenotaph is to be dressed in Union flags as a "place to pay tribute" to those who died during the Second World War. Ceramic poppies will return to the Tower of London, historic landmarks will be floodlit.

So, there has been a suggestion that here in Walmersley we should mark this significant anniversary, giving thanks for all from this area who served in the War.

Weather-wise it was the best of days and the worst of days. The best day one could hope for in late February – dry and bright. But the temperature was only a little above freezing – uncomfortable for anyone standing around waiting for trams and trains to arrive. So was it really a day for travelling?

Three intrepid travellers decided that this was a day for travelling. Let's go over to Liverpool to see the "Threads through the Bible" exhibition in the Anglican cathedral. Not only that, but the proposed itinerary to also include a visit to the Catholic cathedral – making it a two cathedral day.

So we set out from Walmersley in Bury en route for the city of Liverpool. Via car, tram and train we arrived at Liverpool Lime Street late morning. Braving the chill from a very cold wind across the Mersey we walked to the Anglican cathedral.

You really can't miss it. An enormous, traditional, Gothic building rose before us, with a tower reaching to the skies. Yes, this definitely confirmed its status as the largest cathedral in England and 5th largest in the world. Construction started in 1904 and completed in 1924 – so now 100 years old; yet a relative youngster compared to many other of our historic cathedrals. The cathedral website informed us that "Our sacred space has become a platform for cultural dialogue, bridging the gap between the divine and the artistic.....fostering an environment where diverse voices can be heard and appreciated.....yet first and foremost a place of prayer and worship." Well, let's see. In we went.

There was no official entry fee, which there is at some cathedrals these days – especially the historic ones. We had to run a gauntlet of signage asking for a donation – and human welcomers ('chuggers'?) touting the same message whose voices added to the pressure to donate/gift aid before we went further. Eventually we entered the huge space of the cathedral interior. There was what seemed a relatively small area of congregation seating in the centre of the vast nave. The 'Threads' exhibition was divided into three distinct areas around the nave – one for "Creation"; another "The Cross"; and another "Revelation".

Off the main nave area there was also a shop, restaurant and toilets. It was a very busy place. The building was full of people – people walking, talking, looking, eating. The busy buzz lived up to the website description of 'diverse voices, cultural dialogue, etc' but, on this day at least, the 'foremost a place of prayer and worship,' was not in evidence. It all seemed more reminisent of a commercial sales exhibition area rather than a place of prayer and worship.

Anyway, we were there for the exhibition, so.... after lunch in the restaurant.....we turned our attention to "Threads through the Bible". It was spectacular. We felt it to be an incredible spiritual experience. Ten years of work by textile artist Jacqui Parkinson – 44 tapestry panels, more than 25 million stiches. Astonishing in scale, it brought the Bible from Genesis to Revelation to life in a whole new way. Fresh life breathed into well known familiar stories and events. Certainly well worth seeing and experiencing. It has now moved on to tour other cathedrals until 2027. Details of when and where can be found on-line.

Back outside into the chill wind we made our way across to Liverpool's other cathedral – the Catholic Metropolitan Cathedral – locally nicknamed "Paddy's Wigwam". Like its Anglican partner, this cathedral rises above the skyline and you can't miss it. It is the largest Catholic cathedral in England. It is especially striking because it is looks unlike any other cathedral that we had ever seen. The building is an awesome out and out modern statement piece – not one seeking to be imitation of anything which has gone before.

Construction of this cathedral originally began in 1933 to a design by Sir Edwin Lutyens. It was planned to be an essentially traditional building but construction came to a halt when World War II began. Sir Edwin Lutyens died in 1944 but post war the construction to his design continued until it became clear that costs were reaching dizzy heights and work stopped in 1958. Only the foundations and crypt had been completed. In 1962 work began again to a design by Sir Frederick Gibbard which promised 'a new cathedral for a new world.' It was completed in 1967.

Reading the cathedral website we were promised "luminous beauty and spiritual atmoshere."

After climbing what seemed to be a million steps up we reached the main doors . No entry fee; no 'chuggers' asking for a donation; only some small notices asking if you would like to make a donation. We entered the cathedral. A huge circular worship area filled with seating in the round facing toward a central altar space. Natural light streamed in through the many coloured glass windows. Red, blue and yellow light bathing the still quiet space. No cafe or shop impacted this space. There were people in this space but there was no loud buzz of voices, just an air of peace and tranquillity. It certainly lived up to the website decription of luminous beauty and spiritual atmosphere. We had an overwhelming sense that it was one of those 'thin' places where this world and heaven meets — a house of prayer and worship.

All too soon it was time to leave and make our way back to Lime Street Station and return home. Unfortunately the hours we had didn't allow us to give either cathedral a really full exploration — only the main worship areas. However it was a very enjoyable, eye-opening, mind-expanding experience. It made us think about cathedrals — the purpose for which they were built — and the purpose many of them have now come to serve.

We shall have to go again! There is still much to see and reflect on! Barbara, Pam & Nigel.

Under the byline of **Informed Prayer, Prayerful Action** the World Day of Prayer movement aims to promote prayerful living and worship for men, women and young people and help to raise awareness of the lives and concerns of others throughout the world. It began in the 19th century and, as a registered charity raises thousands each year to support projects throughout the world.

On the first Friday of March each year a Day of Prayer begins on the international dateline in Samoa. As the earth rotates, a great wave of prayer builds – across the Pacific, rolling through Asia, the countries of Africa and the Middle East. The wave reaches Europe, moves across the Atlantic to the Americas, and on to the Pacific again until the sun sets over American Samoa where a final service takes place.



Each year the focus is on a different country and the people there write the service used worldwide. Here in Bury the service moves around different churches – this year to St Mary the Virgin where we worshipped using words, music and stories from the Cook Islands, focussing on Psalm 139 and the words "Wonderfully made".

We thank Tricia Stokes who has been our representative on the Bury committee for a number of years but now feels she must stand down.

So, is there someone in our benefice who would be willing to represent us, please? It is not an onerous task! It involves:

- * an annual meeting to arrange a venue, and the logistics of the service finding people to read, etc.
- * publicising details of the service and encouraging people to attend
- * ideally attending the service itself, and maybe taking part.


"Dear Father, help us to remember that we can never find happiness by seeking the things this world has to offer. True happiness can only be ours by following Jesus. Amen."
