A warning to all preachers – be careful what you say in a sermon. A few weeks ago, I used the phrase "the God of second chances" and commented that it would make a good title for a magazine article. So here I am sitting at my computer with a title, having to make my statement a reality - and not much idea where to start.

I have often been told that you don't get a second chance to make a first impression. It was said when I was attending an interview for a job or giving a talk to a group of people I had never met before. I think that is true and even though first impressions can be misleading, they can stick. Yes, I wish after an interview I had been able to go back and say the things that had slipped my mind and often after giving a talk to a church group I could find the answers to questions which had evaded me during the event. But no second chance.

Athletes, especially sprinters, used to be able to have one false start if they jumped the starting gun. Then the rules were changed, one false start and you were out of the event. In the first international meeting after the introduction of this rule even the great Usain Bolt fell short and in last year's Olympics the highly favoured Welsh athlete Jeremiah Azu was dismissed after one false start. All that training, effort, expectation in vain. What a shock, what a disappointment, what a waste.



In the parable of the fig tree, the owner of the vineyard wants to cut down the tree after it failed to produce fruit after three years but the man who tended it asked if he could nurture it and see if it produced fruit in the next year. It is thought that the tree represented the Israelites who had long ignored the words of the prophets and that

God had had enough of their behaviour but Jesus interceded and they were given the second chance.

In another parable the forgiving father welcomes his wayward, prodigal son back into the fold, offering a second chance of family life.

But it isn't only in parables that we see people receiving second chances. Peter denied Jesus three times, yet Jesus made him the rock on which the church was built. Paul as Saul, persecuted Christians with fervour but

on the road to Damascus he was brought to his knees and given a second chance. And how he used that opportunity, taking the gospel to faraway lands spreading the good news of Jesus despite the hardships he encountered.



And what of us? God expects us to produce fruit in his kingdom, he expects us to love our neighbour, to show compassion and to spread the joy of the gospel.

I am sure we all try to do this but sometimes we fail. I know that I often do. But we know that we have a God who is forgiving and will give us a second chance, even more than one if we are truly sorry and work hard to change our ways.

How blessed we are to have a God of Second Chances. Let us make the most of them.

#### Report from a meeting of Christ Church PCC on 18<sup>th</sup> March 2025

- 1. The Revd. Canon Donna Williams led in prayer.
- 2. A Church Building grant certificate is required to be signed.
- 3. The finance report was discussed and it was again noted that we need to register as a charity with the Charities Commission as at the moment we are an excepted charity.
- 4. The Baldingstone trust fund was discussed and it was noted that the proceeds can be used for the advancement of education of children in the parish.
- 5. The Safeguarding officer thanked everyone for the online courses on safeguarding that they had completed.
- 6. There is an area of dry rot that has been identified in the church and Robinsons Preservation have been asked to investigate.
- 7. The new heating system in the church is fully installed and working satisfactorily.
- 8. The churchyard group were informed that petrol mowers and petrol must not be stored in the church cellar.
- 9. There was nothing to report on the Eco agenda.
- 10. It was noted that Easter cards had been purchased and were being delivered in the parish.
- 11. The outreach report discussed a VE 80 celebration and also the provision of hot cross buns on Easter Sunday morning.
- 12. The Lay Chair passed around papers relating to the diocesan vision for 2030 and asked that PCC members read them so they could be discussed fully at a later meeting.
- 13. The Revd. Canon Donna Williams spoke at length on nurturing and prayer there was then a general discussion among the PCC.
- 14. The meeting closed with prayer at 9.15pm

#### From our PCCs

#### Summary of a meeting of Christ Church PCC on 14th April 2025

- 1. The Lay chair informed the PCC that Betty Winterbottom had died and a moment of silence was held whilst everyone remembered all that Betty had done for the PCC and the church over her lifetime.
- 2. The meeting then opened with the Lord's prayer.
- 3. Geoff Hamilton gave congratulations to the treasurer on a good year's finance report. It was noted that we were on track to pay our Parish share.
- 4. The safeguarding policy document was approved by the PCC.
- 5. The church hall group noted that work needed doing on the church hall roof to ensure there was no rainwater leakage into the building and that ceiling tiles needed replacing. Quotes were to be sought for repairing the roof.
- 6. The repair of part of the church electric power sockets had been completed.
- 7. The churchyard group reported that work had been done on the church cellar and that one of the petrol mowers had been repaired.
- Mission community: it was noted that an Easter Vigil will be held at St Mary the Virgin on Saturday the 19<sup>th</sup> of April at 6.30pm and that on the 21<sup>st</sup> of June there is to be a Litter Picking event.
- 9. In the outreach report there was discussion on the arrangements for the Easter Sunday service, the scarecrow festival for 2025 and the VE day celebration on the 6<sup>th</sup> of May in the Church Hall which is taking place over two periods 2-4pm and 6-8pm.
- 10. The lay chair reflected on the comments on prayer that had been made at the last PCC meeting by Revd. Canon Donna Williams. There was then a general discussion on the thoughts expressed.
- 11. The meeting closed at 8.58pm with the Grace.

#### The meeting was held on Sunday 6th April at 12.15pm

- The Church wardens, Rosemarie and June were elected for the year.
- The safeguarding policy and report for the year were approved and commented on.
- There was an opportunity to discuss the PCC report for 2024.
- The main business of the meeting was the treasurer's report for the year. Ian presented the accounts in the usual dashboard format with graphs showing attendances, services and finance. The changes in trends over the last 10 years was plain to see. We then came to our statement of assets and liabilities and the approval of the Independent Examiner's report. Andy Clark continues as our Independent Examiner.
- Ian highlighted that we are still awaiting the results of the Quinquennial inspection from the back end of last year and that there may be significant costs with any work required. This was touched on in the warden's report.
- The electoral roll has now been compiled and stands at just over 50 people.
- There was an acknowledgment of the number of clergy, both active and retired, who have kept the services covered during Harvie's illness. Thanks to all lay people and congregation members for their support and involvement in the running of the Church over the last 12 months.
- There was an opportunity to look through the reports from Deanery Synod and other activities in the booklets.
- The new PCC met after the service to appoint various posts and the next full meeting will be on Tuesday 29th April at 7.30pm.

gather stories from relatives, neighbours, friends who are older (maybe record a chat on your mobile phone), think what you heard from your parents when you were a child;


encourage people to come along with you – to reminisce or simply to listen.

On 23<sup>rd</sup> March 2025 twelve members of our Benefice joined the Muslim Christian Forum to celebrate Iftar, the breaking of the daily fast at sundown during Ramadan.

Before the meal we shared our views on Fasting. Tim Boaden from Seedfield/Jericho Methodist Church spoke of the meaning of Lent and Easter; and Imam Hassanat Ahmed of the Noor UI Islam Mosque spoke of Fasting during Ramadan. During the month of Ramadan Muslims, who are able to, fast from dawn to dusk eating and drinking nothing including water. A common theme for both faiths is the need to spend more time in prayer, fasting and alms giving – a time when we grow in our relationship with God.



Sunset was at 6.30 p.m. when we sat down for the meal of samosa type starters, followed by savoury and sweet rice dishes, medjool dates and fresh fruit and dessert.

Four members of Christ Church were new to the Mosque and were given a guided tour which they enjoyed.

With parts of the world in so much conflict, I thought it was good to see three of our founder members continue their long established friendship – that is Reverend Keith Trivasse, Imam Hassanat Ahmed and Rabbi Warren Elf – a Christian, a Muslim and a Jew joining together for the Iftar meal.

It has been commented that if you attend Church on Palm Sunday and then do not attend again until the following Sunday, Easter Day, then you miss the point entirely. Definitely true, as the various events we have during this most important week are anything to go by. Of course, the week is exceptionally busy, for Ordained clergy, licensed ministers and the Lay people who ensure buildings are unlocked and

services prepared for. Many of these people arrive at Easter Day with a sense of tiredness and and overwhelming feeling of ease that the week has passed without hopefully too many problems. Although we can never know or tell the pains that Jesus Christ suffered during this week, perhaps the busyness of that journey through Holy Week



is an opportunity for us to share in some of that pain, with the many challenges the week brings.

We began by waving our Palm Crosses and hearing the first of probably a few dramatic readings of the Passion Gospel in our services, before continuing with reflective services of Stations of the Cross for the first three days. Maundy Thursday allowed us to share that Last Supper and for some, the chance to be served by having our feet washed in an act that was moving for both the people having their feet washed, and for Paul, who was carrying out the act. After the service, a small number of people observed a vigil in a Gethsemane style garden for one hour with dramatic readings and reflective music. Good Friday is of course a day for contemplation as we focus on the cross and the final hours of Jesus' life. None of us were there on that first Good Friday, but the readings and testimony of those who were, give us cause to reflect on the experiences of those people.

For some, an Easter Vigil and service of light on Saturday evening is that first opportunity to marvel at the Resurrection with the dedication of Paschal Candles and joyful singing. But most prepare to wait until Easter Day when we can all join together in triumph to celebrate the rising from the tomb.

Hopefully, everybody was able to share some part in marking this Holy week and found benefit in whatever stage or stages marked.

It was lovely to hear Harvie's words of inspiration to us all at the joint Benefice service on Easter Day at Christ Church. Despite a difficult twelve months for the Church, both nationally and locally, we were all encouraged to go out and spread the Good News that Jesus Christ is very much alive with us in both our Parishes.

We were asked to ponder why we all attend Church and of course, there will be lots of different answers to that question. What is your reason? As a final thought, Harvie asked us if we were arrested for being a Christian, would there be enough evidence to convict us? For most of us not, but perhaps we can begin to change that this Eastertide.


Are we able to rise to the challenges which Harvie has set us and show our relevance to the people of this Benefice and beyond? Let's see what we can do this year and in the future.
