Is your work finished?

As most of you will know, a couple of months ago I retired (early!) from my job in the graphics industry. I imagined life shifting into a gentler pace. I'd get up a bit later, walk the dog more, watch a bit of day-time telly, have a snooze after lunch and slowly make my way through June's very long list of things to do. But within weeks of stepping away from full-time work, I found myself facing an unexpected question: *What if your work isn't finished?*

As a Reader (Licensed Lay Minister), there is always plenty to be involved with in and around the church and the Diocese, particularly in the last two or three years. And over time, a few people, including some of you, have occasionally teased/challenged: "Ever thought about being ordained?" I always side-stepped it. That was for those who were more certain - and younger.

But in the short time since retiring, there has been a little space. Space where days weren't dictated by back-to-back meetings, deadlines, and reports. In that relative quiet, I began to sense God's voice more clearly. The idea of ordination—once dismissed—now seemed impossible to ignore. The question became more why not rather than why.

Of course there's some very good reasons why not. I'm too old. I think I've earned some rest and I've no particular desire to go "back to college." But God, it turns out, is persistent. The recent parable of the rich man with the barns finally did it for me. One of the sermons that day asked something along the lines of: 'What have you done with your life? What have you done with what you've been given?'

So, I spoke to the Director of Vocations. Who wrote to the bishop. Who said 'yes'. And I asked both of our PCCs for their blessing. And they said 'yes' too.

The Church of England's discernment process is both rigorous and pastoral. At the time of writing most of it is still to come. It will mean

interviews and panels, reflection days, and prayer – as well as the academic study.

If all goes to plan, then I'll be ordained at 63 and priested at 64. I'm rather hoping that, instead of being beyond my sell-by date, that my age will be a gift and not a hindrance. Years of work have taught me to listen, to navigate conflict, to understand the pressures of daily life. I've sat with colleagues in times of loss, celebrated their successes, and learned to find calm in the midst of chaos. Ministry needs all those skills.

This time last year it was crystal-ball time, preparing yet another annual budget for work. This year I'll be wrestling with theology textbooks. I'm sure there will be challenges. Not least, still trying to make my way through June's list...

But retirement doesn't feel like winding down—it's given space for commission. As Psalm 92 says: *"They will still bear fruit in old age, they will stay fresh and green."* I know early 60s doesn't seem very old to some/most of you, but if I'd waited another couple of years, then it would have been too late, and I wouldn't have been accepted.

I'm under no illusion that this new chapter will be easy. But I know it will be rich—with learning, with service, and with the privilege of walking alongside people in the name of Christ. If you'd told me ten years ago that I'd be training for the priesthood in my 60s, I would have laughed it off. Now, it feels like the right thing to do.

My story isn't about a career change. It's about a calling. A calling that waited patiently until I had enough quiet to hear that still small voice saying my name. Or perhaps it was a loud shouting voice that I'd been ignoring! Or maybe it was June getting fed up telling the various voices that I was out at the moment, but could she take a message...

Anyway, enough about me. How about you? What are you called to do?

**Summary of a meeting of Christ Church Walmersley PCC
on 29th July**

- The meeting opened with prayers.
- B. Leung was co-opted onto the PCC.
- The minutes of the previous meeting were approved.
- Repairs to the Church Hall roof have been carried out.
- As part of the Action Plan for Outreach members shared ideas for planning the next steps needed to engage with the current congregation and the wider village community more effectively.
- The Treasurer reported on the current finances.
- Discussion was held around Mission Community events coming up:
 - Tearfund quiz on September 19th (SJSM Hall)
 - Confirmation 21st September at 3.00pm (CCW)
 - Coffee Morning at St. Thomas' on November 8th
 - Easter Vigil at the Parish Church
 - Potential joint Mission Community Ascension Day service.
- Two Lime trees by the South transept are to be felled to prevent dampness to the fabric of the Church. One Ash tree also to be felled in the west of the Church yard.
 - Campfire Church has been approved by the PCC.
 - Lighting tubes are to be replaced in the ceiling of the Church Hall.

1700 years ago, bishops and theologians met in Nicaea (then part of Greece, now Turkey) to come to some consensus on how we should think about the nature of Jesus. To cut a long story short, they concluded that Jesus of Nazareth was both fully human and the Son of God – and as much God as God the Father. This was no small thing to agree on since at the time there were advocates for either/or. Either human or God, but not both.

Tweaked a little a few years later, this agreed statement of belief became known as the Nicene Creed and was accepted as a statement of our faith which believes God to be Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

Earlier this year, the priest and poet, Malcolm Guite said this: 'It is worth pausing for a moment to consider how astonishing this anniversary is. The Nicene Creed has summarised, expressed, and opened out the heart of our shared Christian faith for 17 centuries. Almost nothing else in our culture and heritage has lasted that long. This creed has persisted through wars and revolutions, through changes of dynasty, the birth and development of languages, the rise and fall of empires. It has even survived the tragic divisions of Christendom. For even as Churches and nations battled each other over different understandings of church order, of scripture and of sacrament, they still held this creed in common'.


For those who think best in pictures, the famous Rublev icon, inspired by the story of Abraham and Sarah showing hospitality to three visitors at Mamre, is a powerful image of the three persons of the Trinity, sitting at a table, in perfect harmony with each other; but with space at the table for others to be drawn in. And of course that's still true today. We, as the local church, exist to serve those around us and to share the good news that we are all invited into the loving community which is God.

This Autumn, we will spend a little time to better understand what that means by exploring some of the richness of the Nicene Creed - the statement which has 'summarised, expressed and opened out the heart' of our faith for so long. It would be lovely if you could join us.

We must draw reference to the umpire, who kept his flashing eyes on proceedings throughout. He missed nothing!!

So, who won the gold, silver and bronze medals? Well, that is for you to decide. But all our competitors put on a grand show throughout and thank you to all our builders, straw stuffers and wardrobe designers for constructing the stars and to all involved.

This month's choice Psalm 100, is one of the shortest of the psalms. It has just 4 verses, although some translations split the first verse into two. The most popular hymn version of the psalm is **All people that on earth do dwell** which is normally sung to the tune *The Old Hundredth*. The psalm is split into 2 stanzas: the first two verses in the first and verses 3 and 4 in the second.

It is a psalm of thanks and praise to God on behalf of everyone.

O be joyful in the Lord, all the earth. The psalm invites everyone to make a joyful noise and serve God gladly. It was probably written to be sung by visitors or pilgrims from all over the world as they stood outside the temple gates, suggesting that the psalm was probably written after Solomon's Temple was built. The word *presence* comes from the Hebrew word for face. Jesus used it in this sense when he said, "He who has seen me has seen the Father." So, the worshippers are invited to come in and worship, not at a distant God, but a very personal one.

In verse 2 comes the fundamental Jewish (also Christian and Muslim) belief that there is only one God and that he created each one of us; we had no part in it.

Know that the Lord is God. It is he that has made us, and we are his (in the Book of Common Prayer it says, **And not we ourselves**). The phrase **we are the sheep of his pasture** reminds us that kings are often metaphorically referred to as "shepherds" of their people so their realms could be referred to as "pastures".

Verses 3 and 4 form the second stanza. It is parallel in structure to the first one, namely a call to praise followed by a declaration of why the Lord is worthy of praise. The two stanzas are complementary. In verse 3, the priest or temple official calls out to the pilgrims to **enter his gates with thanksgiving**. The pilgrims are then asked to **give thanks to God and bless his name**. The psalm ends with a reminder that God is good (gracious) and that **His steadfast love is everlasting**. These are

good reasons why God should be thanked and praised. There is no limit to God's gracious nature or to his love and these attributes are not confined to individual lifetimes but are passed on to succeeding generations. He is loyal to people to the end of time. **His faithfulness endures from generation to generation.**

Below is a modern version of the psalm from the Common Worship Daily Prayer Book. (2002) Church House Publishing.

1 O be joyful in the Lord, all the earth,
serve the Lord with gladness
and come before his presence with a song.

2 Know that the Lord is God.
It is he that has made us and we are his;
we are his people and the sheep of his pasture.

3 Enter his gates with thanksgiving and his courts with praise.
Give thanks to him and bless his name.

4 For the Lord is gracious; his steadfast love is everlasting,
And his faithfulness endures from generation to generation.
