## Summary of a meeting of Christ Church Walmersley PCC on 4<sup>th</sup> November

- The meeting opened with prayers.
- ➤ The minutes of the previous meeting, on 9<sup>th</sup> September 2025, were approved.
- ➤ A Community Survey was discussed. It was agreed to present it first to the congregation to ascertain their opinion of it and ask their feedback as to any alterations that may be made. The aim then is to circulate it to the village community.
- > The financial report was discussed.
- Six Lime trees on the Church walk are to be pollarded.
- Work is to be carried out to repair the toilet roof and cladding in the Church Hall.
- > The replacement of the Church Hall lights with LED panels is to be carried out by Corbetts Electrics Ltd.
- Everyone has completed the relevant Safeguarding courses. The wardens have another to complete which other members of the PCC may do if they wish.
- ➤ After careful consideration it was decided to reject the request to site a charity clothing bin in the Church Hall yard.
- New Church notice boards, to replace the ones on either side of the Lychgate, have now arrived and will be erected soon.
- The Christmas Tree Festival will be from Friday 12<sup>th</sup> to Sunday 14<sup>th</sup> December.

- ➤ The meeting closed at 8.58pm with The Grace

## Summary of the St. John with St. Mark PCC meeting of 6th November 2025

- Services are now covered to the end of January including Christmas services. There will be an Advent bible study in the Barritt Room from Tuesday 25th November.
- There are a few DBS checks currently in hand. Some PCC members have recently completed the online courses.
- Mission Community activities: There was a review of the quiz night.
   It was noted that St. John with St. Mark have been asked to host this event again in 2026. Following a meeting at the end of October, other events proposed for next year are a litter picking day (May), joint Sunday evening worship (June) and a Mission Community Confirmation (July).
- Alan Thew has volunteered to take up the Foundation Governor post at St. John with St. Mark School. Alan was accepted by PCC.
- We have received a thank you certificate from Christies for the recent fundraising donations, particularly at the Eden Singers concert.
- A letter was received from All Saints' AOS society asking if they can hire our hall for their future productions. This will be considered.
- The income survey has now been completed and the forms will be sent off shortly.

- We discussed our charitable giving for 2025. We will again donate 10% of our planned giving to 10 different charities and also continue with our Christmas offerings from our various collections. Agreed charities this year included Smile Train and Bury Cancer Support. Please see a member of our PCC for the full list, if you like.
- Rosemarie reminded people about the Christmas Fair and an appeal for help on stalls, especially in the kitchen.
- Health & Safety: It has been noted that the turnlock on the inner hall door is difficult to move; We are also awaiting a battery for the defibrillator.
- Next PCC meeting is Thursday 15th January 2026 at 8.00pm.

#### September – Thankfulness

We kicked off the season with a celebration of thankfulness. As the fire crackled, we popped popcorn over the flames—always a favourite! — and shared moments and memories we were grateful for, writing or drawing them on 'flames'. The air was filled not only with the smell of fresh popcorn but with the sound of laughter and heartfelt reflections.

#### October - The Sower

In October, we explored the parable of the Sower. Everyone got hands-on with seed planting, connecting the story to our own lives as we thought about the kind of soil we offer for God's word. Meanwhile, dough was rolled, shaped, and placed to cook over the glowing embers. There's nothing quite like bread baked on a campfire—and it tasted even better shared together!



#### November - Being the Light

As the days grew darker, our November theme "Being the Light" felt especially meaningful. Despite the rain which put off some regulars, children and adults alike enjoyed decorating biscuits with bright, colourful icing, each fire-shaped biscuit a reminder of how we can shine God's love into the world. The creativity (and sugar!) flowed freely.

Campfire Church continues to be a place of warmth, community, and discovery. We look forward to many more gatherings where faith and fun meet around the fire!

Why not come as a shepherd or angel to our December gathering (see page 28)? Then in 2026 we shall be meeting regularly on the  $4^{th}$  Tuesday of each month.

Last month Tricia Stokes and I attended the A.G.M. of the Bury Faith Forum at The United Reformed Church in Bury.

The meeting, chaired by Rabbi Warren Elf, reported on several successful multifaith activities. One event included 11 primary and secondary school groups of 10 children and 2 teachers each spending the day at Guardian Angels school, learning of the many religions in Bury. There were 10 stalls - 8 different faiths and 2 community groups inspired by faith. The feedback was positive with a high level of learning, engagement and participation. After 2 successful years it may become an annual event.

Future events planned are a Multifaith evening and an event in Hate Awareness Week in February. No details yet.

The A.G.M closed with prayers for Peace and for the victims of attacks on Mosques and Synagogues. We prayed especially for those killed or affected by the recent attack on Heaton Park Synagogue on the Day of Atonement, Yom Kippur, on 2nd October.

After refreshments, the meeting continued with a discussion to mark Hate Crime Awareness Week 2025

#### "Our Living Faiths in Bury"

Members of the audience, Christian, Muslim, Jews and Sikhs spoke of how they live in Bury and hope their faith gives a positive influence on their lives and society.

Jagmail Singh and Ravinder Kaur of the Manchester Sikh community were invited to tell us about their faith. They believe there is only one God and <u>everyone</u> is equal before God. Their Holy Book is called Guru Granth Sqhib Ji, and is kept in their place of worship, known as Gurdwara or Temple.

Sikhs usually wear a turban, they also do not cut their hair, and wear a cotton undergarment and steel bangle, carry a wooden comb and a small decorative sword.

Sikhism encourages people to donate 10% of their total income both financially or in the form of Sewa (selfless service) to help others. Each Gurdwara has a Langar – a community hall kitchen - which serves food free to everyone irrespective of any Caste, Gender or Status.

A few of our church members witnessed this community service when, with the Bury Muslim Christian Forum, we had a guided tour of the Gurdwara Sri Guru Harkrishan Sahib near Strangeways Prison. After the tour we joined about a hundred people of all walks of life being fed in their communal dining area where we all mixed together with no recognition of status. When our hosts had seen us settled they left to take food to a soup kitchen they run in Piccadilly Gardens and to hand out sleeping bags and other items needed by the homeless. That day we saw faith in action.

One sentence I remember from the meeting was a saying by a 16<sup>th</sup> century Guru:

"Before becoming a Sikh, a Muslim, a Hindu or a Christian, Let's become a good Human first. "

#### JAM Group



We have not had a JAM over the last few weeks as we decided to stay in Church. Here is a prayer though to remind us that you are always with us and here for us:

'God you love us and are always with us. You are ready to help us and make us strong. God, we give our love to you. Amen.'

#### Mary's Song — Magnificat

The Magnificat is one of the great hymns of the church, past and present. It is part of the 1662 Prayer Book's Evening Prayer Service. It is, in fact, a canticle. I was a young chorister in the 1950s onwards and I used to sing the Magnificat as part of Evensong. It is particularly important during Advent and Christmas because Mary said these words when she was expecting Jesus. Jews were taught to memorise many words from the Hebrew scriptures and the words from the Magnificat would be among them.

Magnificat is the first word in the Latin version of the song and means "glorifies." It is similar to Hannah's Song in 1 Samuel 2: 1-10. Hannah gave thanks for the birth of her son, Samuel, using those words.

Mary was visiting Elisabeth, her cousin, who, in her old age, was expecting the birth of a child who would be John the Baptist, often spoken of as the forerunner who would prepare the people for the coming of Jesus, the Messiah.

Mary and Elisabeth would be familiar with the scriptures (our Old Testament) where the prophets had spoken about a Messiah coming to bring peace and hope to his people. The prophets such as Isaiah had foretold the coming of a Messiah: Isaiah 9: 6 - 7, chapter 11: 40. Micah and many other prophets spoke of the coming of a Messiah. Handel's "Messiah" uses many of the prophecies about God's son coming and bringing peace and joy to the world.

Much of what Mary said is reflected in Jesus' preaching where he warns the rich not to trust in their wealth and promises God's kingdom to the poor.

He has not forgotten to show mercy to Abraham and his children's children for ever.






